Deadly Reckoning Seen in Nation's Rising Traffic Toll!

Every year reveals a staggering increase in traffic deaths and injuries, not to mention property losses, plus losses from employment and personal activity.

Consensus of officers handling this grisly report is that people just lack courtesy, concern for others (and themselves) through negligence, carelessness, indifference and-- alcohol.

An aid to the press in collecting data is Travelers Insurance of Hartford, who put out an illus-

trated annual with figures that truly knock one over.

The increase in injuries last year was staggering, up 7% for a total of 3,078,000. Deaths went up to 38,000. But more than 3,116,000 persons were injured or killed, a shameful record, a most "deadly reckoning".

Gov. Brown is working hard to better state conditions, just signed one measure requiring a mandatory jail sentence for one convicted for the second time of driving while his license is suspended or revoked.

We believe that the states should have uniform traffic laws, just like flying. Also student instruction, stricter physical rules for the ailing and the aged. We need more courtesy at all times toward the other fellow.

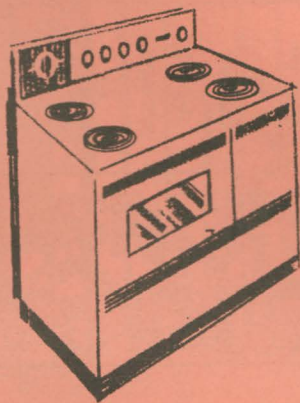

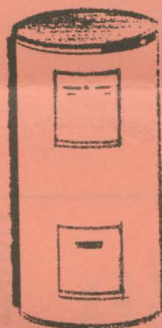
