VOTERS SCOTCH TAX

The school board, Supt. Gilley, the PIA and parents in this district are in a dither over knowing just what will be the status of the three schools this September, due to voters having denied the tax hike at Tuesday's election.

It was the second time they turned it down, both elections were 376 noes while the January yes score was 122, last week it rose to 282. Thus the rate instead of going to \$1.86, will revert to the legal 90¢, as the current rate of \$1.51 expires June 30.

The favorable vote upped by 125% with total ballots up 30%, rather remarkable considering that the primary had been just one week before. It is believed that the added yes votes were due to the hard work of the Citizens Committee, also the Kiwanis Club which urged people to get out and vote, but not taking sides. The sickening part of it, according to civic-minded people, is that only 55% of eligible voters cast ballots!

Note- Perhaps this is an indication of just how alert and enthused are the citizens of this country when they allow such a thing as this to happen when we so badly need education, the sparkplug to progress. -CI

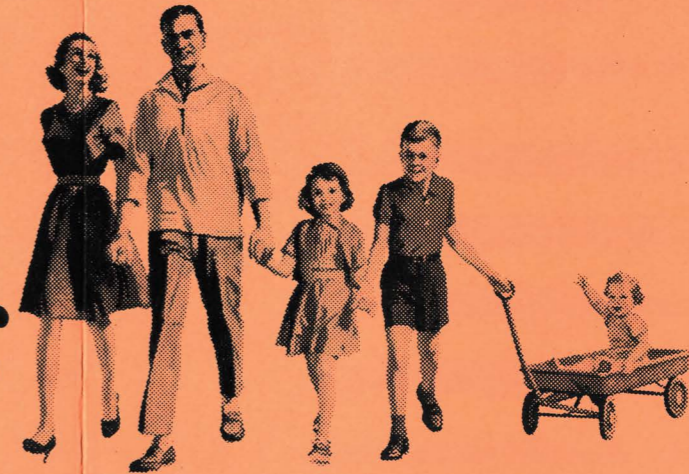
SAFE AND SANE FOURTH

Dedicate Air Tower

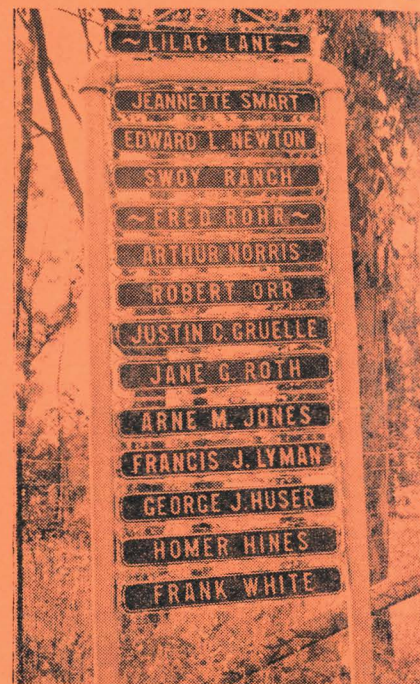

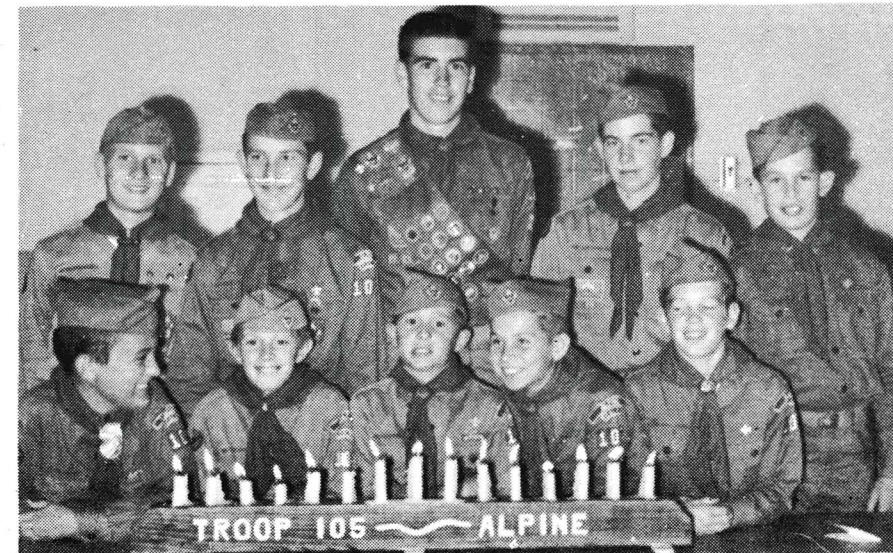

County has Power that Aids Big Growth

Yesterday a shiny new highly efficient Westinghouse turbo-generator of 142,000 kw capacity, was dedicated by the San Diego Gas & Electric Co., at its South Bay Power plant. It has been in use since the 16th, adding its smoothly produced energy to the huge volume now being served the county by this pioneer utility.

H.G. Dillin, firm president, officiated at the ceremony, attended by

city and county officials, civic executives of incorporated cities in the district served, members of the press, radio and TV, and other guests.

The president told how the fine new generator 'adds to the service in behalf of area development--the company, as a partner in progress with the area it serves, is pledged to fulfill its role of supplying electricity which is essential to continued growth'.

The company, ever since its inception with a few arc lights at street corners, has grown with the county, ever increasing and improving its service until today it supplies energy not only for huge residential areas, but for industry, business and many other lines, including a vast gas network and steam for downtown buildings.

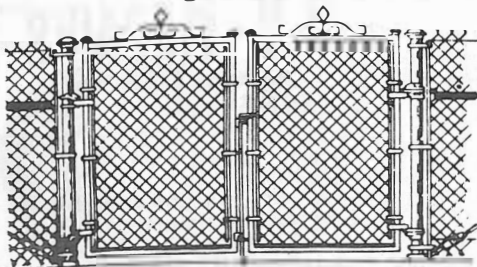

While motorists exercise patience in following hay trucks, trailers or slow drivers on Hwy 80, there is a bright light of progress looming, according to Jacoba Dekema, highway engineer in charge of the SD area. He told the Sun yesterday that they have already bought a million dollars of rights-of-way east of EC, and work on freeway plans to Alpine is coming along fine.

'A lot depends on next year's budget before we know what we can do' he said. Federal roads must however, be done by 1972, but the section from eastern EC to Alpine will, of course, be in use within the next two or three years.

The highway commission has just earmarked \$44,700 for reconstruction and surfacing of 0.7 mile on Hwy 80 west of Descanso Junction, which will make that section easier on motorists.
