JONES & LA FORCE WIN

Alpine Fire Commission now has a full roster with the election last Tuesday of Wm. H. (Corky) Jones, and J.C. LaForce, incumbent. They fill vacancies made by term expirations of J.C. LaForce and E.L. Freeland, who had been appointed by the supervisors, to fill a vacancy caused by the death of Dick Robinson.

Making up the board, which is committed to the 'four year plan' of getting hydrants all over Alpine without more taxes or bonds, are Chairman Al Hinkle, Secretary O.E. Palmer and Phil Hall.

This means that they will buy a pumper truck to make use of some 26 hydrants proposed within the fire district and served by Rio SD MWD.

This showed the largest number of ballots in any such election, over 200 of 800 registered voters balloting. LaForce polled 204 and Jones 159 in write-ins, there being no names on the ballot.

It is claimed that with this new hydrant system and pumper, fire insurance rates will be materially reduced when approved by the underwriters.

Rachel Carson's Death is Loss to World

The death Wednesday of Rachel Carson, only 56, by cancer, came as a shock to the world. It is a great loss, because she was an acknowledged benefactor to mankind, not only esthetically for her entrancing book 'The Sea Around Us, a best seller of 1951, but for her current best seller and provocative volume 'Silent Spring'.

Even her first tome, 'Under the Sea Wind', which NY Sun said was 'One of the

most beautifully imaginative books about the ceaseless cycle of life', showed her writing ability.

Miss Carson was a true nature lover, her chosen habitat being the great outdoors where she learned firsthand millions of strange facts of life, for she became a biologist, taught at the famous Johns Hopkins University.

But her strongest bid as a benefactor of mankind came only recently in her astonishing book about the use of sprays, 'Silent Spring', which made the US government turn around on its position about these poisons used in agriculture.

The country and the whole world with its future generations, will never be able to replace this inspiring author and scientist. - CI

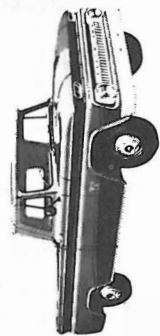

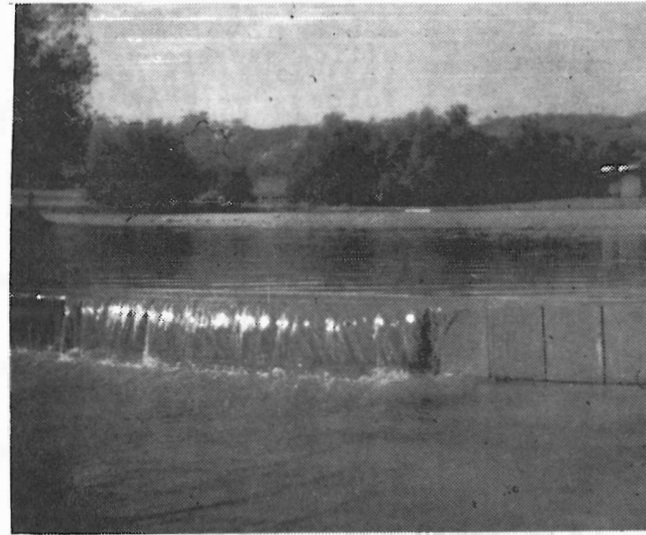

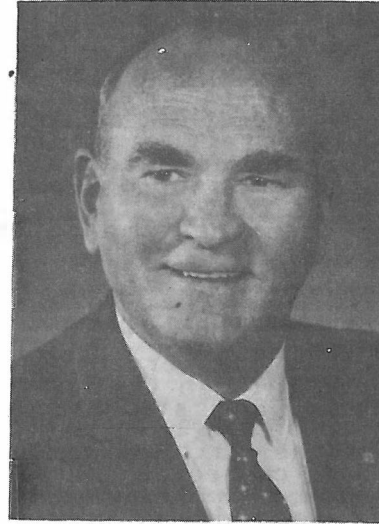
