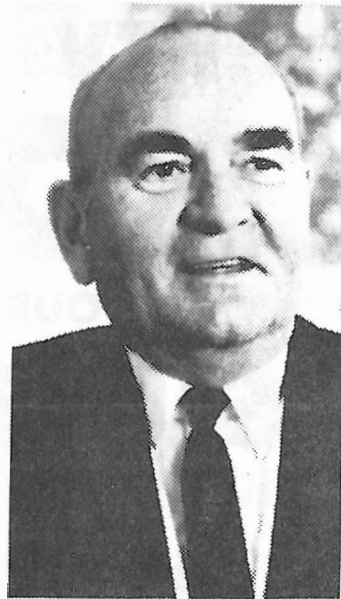
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RADIO BANS SMOKE ADS

MRS. MANLY REELECTED

At the annual election of the 19th Area, WWI Barracks and Auxiliary Sunday last in the Legion Building at CV, Mrs. John Manly was named for a second term as area historian. Alpine's Mountain Barracks was represented by the Manlys and the Donn Griswolds.

COUNTY FAIR

Judging by the sparkling and spectacular lineup of events and exhibits, the 1964 San Diego County Fair and Southern California Exposition will live up to its slogan: "The Liveliest Days of the Year."

There will be 10 lively days, beginning June 26, ending July 5, in the 75th renewal of this now-annual county-wide extravaganza.

One of the nation's largest and finest, the San Diego County Fair drew 338,000 persons through the turnstiles last year to smash the all-time attendance record by 46,000.

"We have planned and are working to present the finest fair in our history—in quality, in variety, in new features, and in value for the fairgoers", a fair official declared, recently.

Among new attractions expected at the Fair this year will be the D. Robert Jones Youth Center, the first new building on the grounds in more than a decade.

The \$200,000 building, named for the Fair's youth-minded manager who died early this year, will house Junior Fair exhibits and activities, and a major educational display.

Headlining the liveliest Fair ever:

(1) "The Old Diego Trail", a 50-foot animated diorama, depicting early-day San Diego County historical events in near-fictional style. Surrounding this will be numerous authentic exhibits, including 20 original "Famous Gun Fighters" paintings by Artist Lea Franklin McCarty, from the Commercial Hotel in Elko, Nevada; the James S. Copley-commissioned Southwest history books; a special Old West gun collection; and, early-day San Diego photographs.

(2) the world's largest National Horse Show, an 11-day event that begins June 25, a day before Fair gates open. A total of 1700 horses and 4900 entries in both junior and

senior classes, from 30 states, are expected to compete.

(3) the world's largest outdoor flower show, featuring 4,500 exhibits under 5 acres of green netting.

(4) the fair's largest and finest art show, with competition by both professional and amateur artists from Santa Barbara to the border. A feature of the art show will be "the moment of creation" with artists demonstrating sculpting, print-making, pottery, painting and other arts. The show jury will be of national reputation.

(5) ten days of top-flight entertainment, starring singer Jimmy Dean, the Jubilee Four and Roy Clark in the Jimmy Dean Show, June 26-June 29; and screen-TV star Bob Cummings, presenting "Circustime", a series of American and European circus acts, June 30-July 5. Performances are at 3:30 p.m. and 8 p.m. daily in the 6,000-seat grandstand.

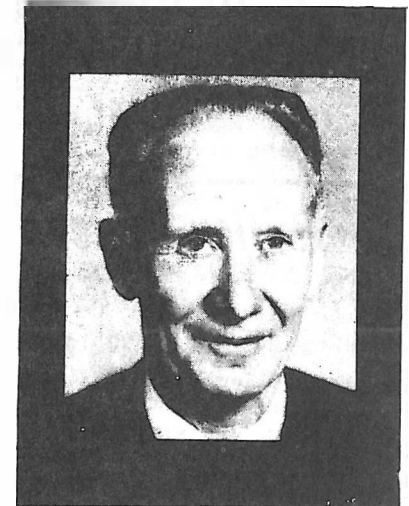

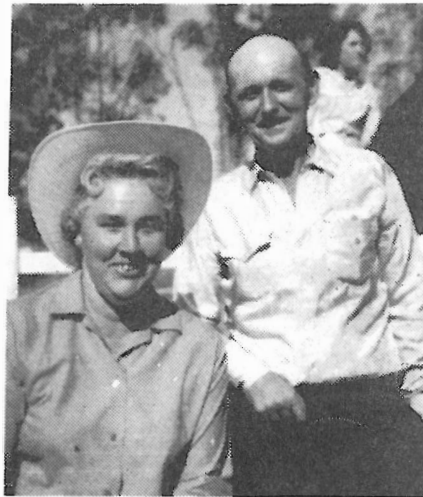
