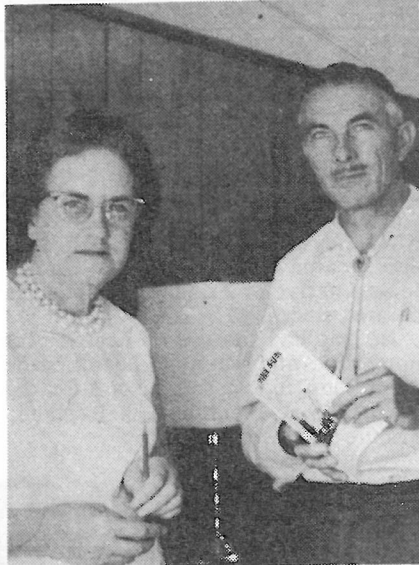

FIREMEN SAVE LIFE

"If it had not been for the quick action by the Alpine Fire Department, I probably would not be here" says Mrs. J. L. Mosier, White Oak Drive, Thursday morning between 5 and 6 o'clock, she was bitten by a black widow spider on the shoulder and woke up with a stinging sensation. Five minutes later her breathing became difficult and she almost lost consciousness. Her husband called the fire department for oxygen and within 7 minutes Mace Bratt and several others were on hand to give her assistance which no doubt saved her life. Neda Hill sped them to the Grossmont Hospital where Dr. W. Pfeiffer gave her injections to counteract the poison. The doctor said "No doubt about it, if oxygen had not been administered, death probably would have followed within minutes.

Mrs. Mosier has only praise for Alpine's volunteer fire department and said "When we needed them, they were on the job" and "how grateful we are for these conscientious boys".

Cdr. F.F. McDonnell of Cat's Acres, Alpine Heights, suffered a slight heat stroke last week, but has made complete recovery.

EDITORIAL

LA Riots Were Centuries in the Making!



The good people of America, white and colored, were shocked, ashamed, maddened by the frightening savagery of rioting mobs in Los Angeles. Now they seek a reason for this unbelievable murder and destruction.

The Negro, from those first kidnapped, imprisoned slaves who were bought and sold, separated from their families and kept uneducated, has had a difficult time advancing to the splendid position he occupies in government, industry, sports, business, the arts and so on. And he fought nobly beside the white man to preserve freedom.

Slavery itself has been practiced for thousands of years, by warlords in Rome, Greece, and by the Hebrews.

Poor men even sold their children! We have seen that in China. The poor native black man had no future; he still sees none for his masses.

In America the Dutch sold the first Africans at Jamestown in 1619. Spanish colonists on Caribbean islands brought them in 1517. Our colonists began trading them in 1630 and by 1860 four millions were here just before the war.

As property, slaves had no legal rights. In 1807 Congress prohibited imports, but the law was poorly enforced. Many were badly housed, clothed and fed. Many bought freedom, but some themselves owned slaves. The KKK brought violence, with police harassment, the poll tax, no voting and so on.

Pondering this riot question it becomes clear that racial or mob psychology must blow up sometime, and this is what happened. Socrates about 400 BC believed that goodness is based on knowledge and unkindness is based on ignorance. Keeping a man or a race in ignorance breeds unkindness, which the riots were in extreme degree--unkind to America, to the white man, to the black man. Their cause of equality has been damaged irreparably.

The Negro's labor helped make America prosperous, but as one Negro said "You spend millions on rockets and foreign aid but nothing on helping our poor people". Perhaps the white man will someday blow up because his taxes and costs are rising so steadily and poverty, schooling, employment still give us a future that is not so bright, causing juvenile delinquency and so on. -CI

Changing one thing for the better is worth more than proving a thousand things are wrong.

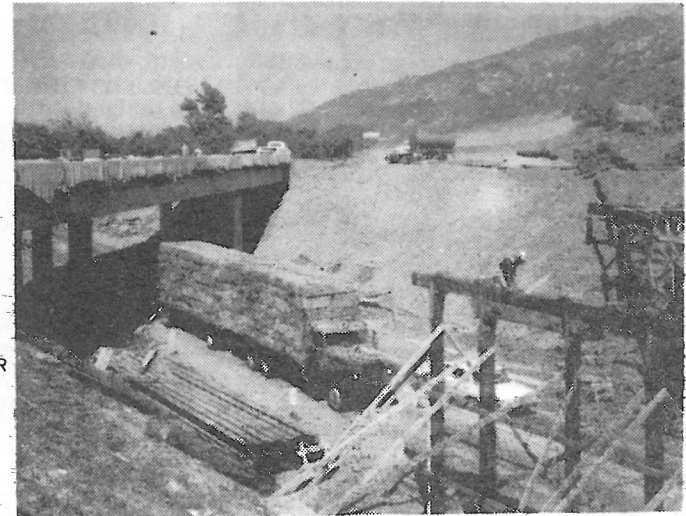

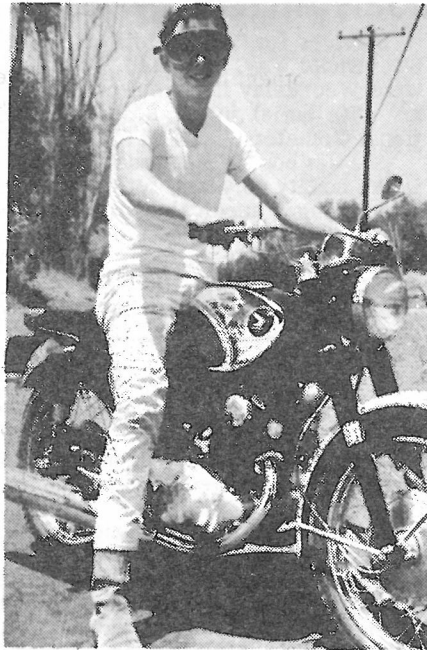

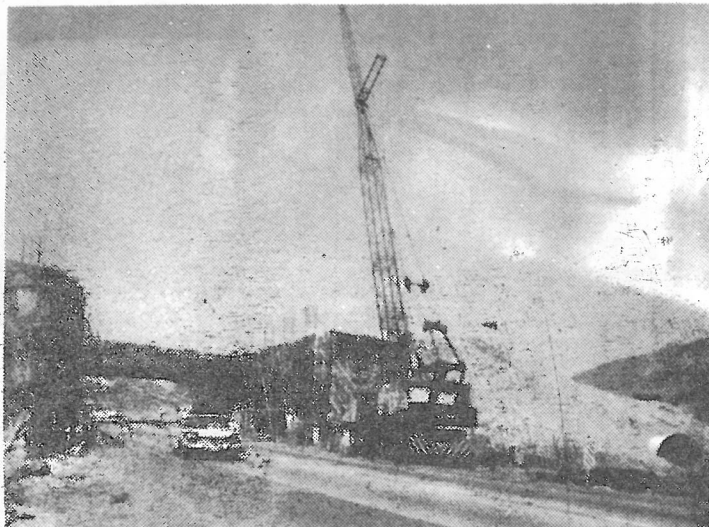
