

Science to Bring Technological Death?

A scientist has looked ahead 20 years to 1984 at which time he predicts some dire results of our modern science and technology.

He is Dr. Paul R. Ehrlich, Stanford University biologist who made a startling talk recently in Riverside. He foresees a continued rise in such progress but with it he envisions catastrophe caused by the population ex-

plosion destroying all that makes life comfortable and delightful.

Few today remember those "good old days" of peaceful confidence in the future, like before WW1, even WW2. In those times we lived more normally, and someday we who survive, will no doubt return to those same days of tranquillity.

Dr. Ehrlich noted how domestic food animals will be reduced due to waste of solar energy. Students will be depersonalized into mere learning machines; taught by computers and recorders. We will indeed inherit a "silent spring" with more soil being permanently ruined by salts from irrigation, pesticides and wastes.

Perhaps mankind should stop and ponder upon his future before he has

no future. -CI





Aug. 21 and that he had had 12 complaints on noise.

Lutz has applied for a variance on non-conforming use, which can be expanded. If races are held-- and they were slated for Saturday night -- the Building office can file charges with the sheriff, but this the board said would not be done unless races are run.

Ed. Note- Races have been held, complaints made, two to the Sun, but as no meetings were held, no committee formed, no action taken, (even by the chamber of commerce) it did not become "news" until Boney and the board acted. Yet races have been held for many weeks. We are judging this, but we believe it should be handled in a democratic manner. That is why we are in Viet Nam today. -CI.

Lutz made this statement: "We believe we are legal as we raced motorcycles and microcars before zoning came. I feel that if Alpine wants the kids off the streets on Saturday nights and many people enjoy it, they should get behind it 100%. We have petitions, and have had 200 calls to say they like it and are behind it, and I appreciate this. But if five or 10 are opposed and do not give the town a chance to act on it, it is not right and I want my name cleared. I have lived here 15 years and have tried to, boost this place. If the majority want the raceway closed, then we will close it, but Mr. Boney rammed this criminal action through and I had no chance whatsoever to act in a regular legal manner." 



Editor: The Sun:

We give lip-service to individual rights, legal rights and the like-- but how often are we ready to defend these many "rights" in a properly prescribed manner?

There is evidence that a quiet, peaceful and retired community took exception towards an equally quiet, peaceful, but far from retirement, individual of Alpine. Regrettable, the complainants taking issue against a temporary speedway, behind Lutz's Garage, did not consider the local needs of all its members but rather "ram-rod" their complaints to the Supervisors-- much less give consideration to resulting effects to the individual.

The first indication of a complaint was an unidentified person, the second was a complainant who voiced political influence, and appointed himself as "committee number 1" to fight his issue to the financial destruction of the in-

dividual in question. The third appeared in a newspaper noting complaints received. None meet the requirements necessary to discuss a local issue which is important to all. Seemingly, those with the strongest objections to the noise of the track, gave consideration to personal needs without regard for the general good the track is serving. Secondly, the company was not advised to discuss the disadvantages or advantages with any interested group or individual. Therefore, there seems to be little need to suspect the community is strongly opposed to a temporary project which has given over 3,000 people pleasure.

The purpose of this letter is not to criticise those who complain against noise but to criticise the methods used to resolve a local problem, which has resulted in the temporary, abandoned but-- all ready legally established speedway. --Emelie H. Kelly

McGRATH ZOOMING

The earth is really flying down at the east end of the new stretch of Interstate 8 (Hwy 80) where Harbison Canyon Road comes in. C.W. McGrath, contractor, says he wants to get it done fast and his men are really making it show, as the photo reveals.

McGrath won the job with a low bid of \$1,425.421. for the 1.6 miles of 4-lane freeway which runs from the two concrete bridges at Flinn Springs, up to HC Road. The last of the new route will reach Alpine in 2.8 miles, but it extends to the Willows. McGrath is to put in the interchange at Dunbar Lane, with access roads which will later go under a bridge to connect with HC Rd.

Completion is expected by the fall of 1966 which will put Alpine within 25 to 30 minutes of downtown SD. Now many drivers, without hinkering trucks, trailers and slow drivers, now make regularly in 29 to 31 minutes without breaking speed laws.

areas within its boundaries will be lower in the coming fiscal year. Directors have adopted budgets and set rates.

In this improvement district, which covers areas where water is retailed, are Alpine, Dehesa, Harbison Canyon, La Cresta, Flinn Springs and Blossom Valley, New budget is \$432,762, compared with \$422,592 last year.

Combined new rate will be \$2.54 down from \$2.60. The district's general rate will be up as it is to acquire a lake and make other improvements. Tax goes from 15¢ to 20¢ per \$100.

Houser told the Sun that Alpine gets a net 6¢ saving. The first year, starting in July 1962, it was \$2,38; 2nd year \$2,35; last year \$2,23 and this year, \$2,18.
