McCOY to CLOSE OFFICE Firemen Aid Infant

Dick Garner, manager of the Hugh L. McCoy Realty office, 2253 Hwy 80, told the Sun this week that they are closing this branch, will move back to SD on Nov. 30.

EDITORIAL



World's Richest Man for Labor Unions!

J. Paul Getty, classed as the world's wealthiest human, has strong feelings on organized labor "that we would like to see listened to in the business community", says the October Classroom Teacher.

This I read with much interest because Paul Getty and I were raised in Santa Monica and LA, went to many society parties together, and kept track of each other for many years. The last time I saw him was when he invited me to visit him at his home on the beach. He showed me some of his art treasures and we reminisced over those "really good old days".

Anyhow, Getty is quoted: "I am a union man myself. I don't carry a card or pay dues to any local, but I do believe in unions and that free, honest labor unions are our greatest guaranties

of continuing prosperity and our strongest bulwark against social or economic totalitarianism".

He believes that "the majority of Americans have decent homes, cars, radio and TV sets and all the rest;" that "we pride ourselves on the level of the American standard of living", which would "hardly be possible if the great mass of the workers weren't well-- even highly-- paid."

On another page a veteran screen actor, Geo. Chandler, recalled early days of films to demonstrate that unions are as necessary to professionals, whether actors or teachers, as to other groups seeking improvement in salaries and working conditions.

I remember when I was in pictures how a company could be kept on the set hours after a normal workday was over, till the cameramen had the first union. When the day finished, you stopped work and that was it. Then the actors got their guild going and between the two, making films was not hard labor any more and blacklists became obsolete, the unions protected their members!-Ci

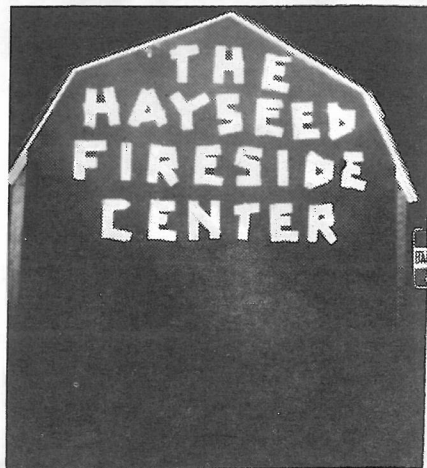

KELLOGG TO LEAVE McCOY OFFICE

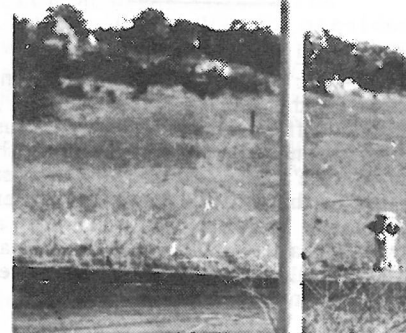

The tiny streaks are stars in motion.

The Daily Californian of EC ran a magnificent shot by Grant L. Hansen of LM last week, using a Polaroid which caught an airplane coming in for a landing at Gillespie Field, the rotating red signal dotting its path.
