


War Gets Ex-Alpiner

Criticize Freeway Land Valuations.

With 10 home and land owners quite unhappy over the state offers for their properties needed by the freeway, based on appraisals of staff experts, an attorney and his appraiser are working for these people to get what they think is rightfully theirs.

Seemingly to aid them comes a story out of Washington, D.C., by John Pierson, quoting Rex Whitton, US Highway administrator for the Department of Commerce, highlighting the attitude of some states on buying or condemning properties for the new interstate freeway system.

Whitton said they should be micer to property-owners, and they should

not be reimbursed unless prices are somewhere right, as the federal government pays 90% of the cost of lands thus acquired.

He added that it should not be necessary for people to have to bargain with these state highway departments who have offered less than the true value of property.

He scored condemnation proceedings, chiefly where states had not even contacted owners personally, said they should observe more compassion toward property owners.

In Alpine it is known that many landowners accepted the state's first offer, but with some unhappiness,, yet several have received high compensation for comparable land and old buildings, when compared with some of the newer and more costly homes, it is no wonder that they are campaigning for a more fair price.-CI

Pres. Al Adams of the Youth Center says they had a nice meeting Monday night, heard Ben Cairo, Soule Steel Co., on proposed new buildings.



It was decided to work up a letter to send to all registered voters inviting them to join the organization. Next session is on Friday, April 1.






RUMMAGE SALE MAR. 24-25




Enrollment up 28



After a 2-months training and reorganization course in Okinawa, following service at Da Nang earlier,







Doctors Met `n Ham Radio


