The paper said "As the area grows, many feel the time may soon be opportune for a new motel, possibly with a restaurant combination". (The Sun has been working for many years to get an airpark here which would spark a lot of activities.)

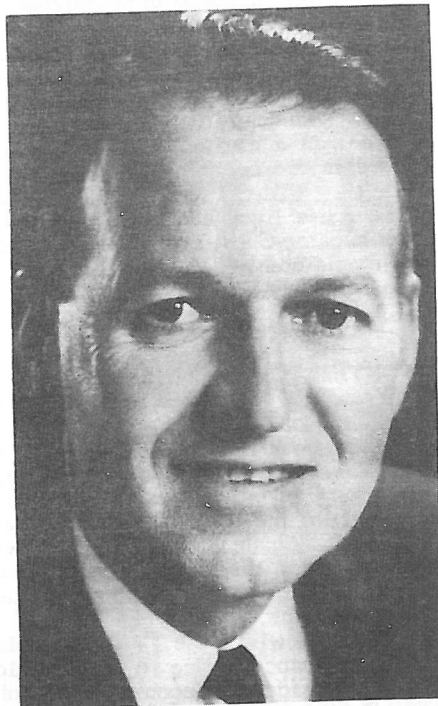
