## It's Easy to Reduce High Cost of Living.

This thought is aimed more toward folks who feel the rising cost of food, especially those with families, rather than those of more affluence who buy what they want, regardless of cost.

Our main thought is for the price of food, man's chief requirement above shelter or clothing. You need not be labeled a food faddist or a health crank if you can change your eating habits so as to save money. We have done that for years, and find health is far better.

For one thing, it has been pointed out that man can live with far less meat than was once supposed; fruits;

nuts, grains, salads and the highly nutritious soybean are suggested. Many today use brewer's yeast, wheat-germ, rice polish and numerous items from the health food stores, to yield better nutrition, plus better health.

It is impossible here to give directions, but there are many books on this topic in libraries, and available in health shops. For example, I have sold over 10,000 copies of a small book I wrote on physical fitness; "Health, with Remedies & Recipes" \$1. On my program over XEMO, Radio 860, (Sunday 11 pm & Monday 12:45 noon), I have sold many in the western states, helped people to change their diet for financial savings as well as bettering family health.

Believe me, this is something to think about and investigate. -CI

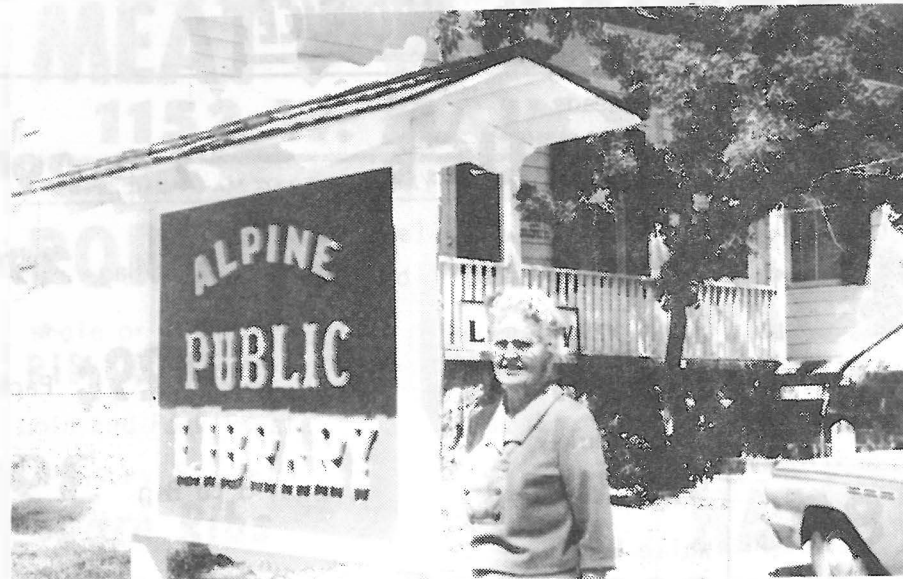
