

Boom-&-Bust is Creeping Up Behind You!

Last month Pacific Telephone reinstated the 10% tax on phone bills. explained in a news note from E.B. McKenzie, manager of the EC office. Of course it is not a phone charge; they only collect for the US.

We just had enjoyed the reductionto 3% on Jan. 1, and it was to be fully reduced. Nowit will drop to 1% on April 1, 1968, then be completely eliminated by that year's end.

This reminded us of the recent announcement wherein the Kiplinger Letter said "The next few years will see the biggest boom this country has ever known. And with it...inflation".

Back in 1935 during the depression, Kiplinger foresaw the turn, predicted inflation. Thousands took heed and profited. Inflation did come along, Prices rose as he forecast. Many improved their condition, but many lost by not knowing, or believing.

The signs are obvious, more taxes, rising prices, interest rates upwhich have slowed down progress in building and so on. County taxes will rise they say. Now if a person sells his car himself he has to pay sales tax. This is all as Kiplinger said it would be, so might be wise to look into it and profit thereby. -CI




