Monday Real Americans Always Remember

The sacred remains of three veterans lie under the warm soil in Alpine Cemetery where a small piece of the good earth support the Veterans' Memorial. It is a simple.arrangement with inscribed stone, a wall, and tree. But it represents America's brave men who gave their lives, or limbs, or who still lie suffering in hospitals across this great and free land.

Monday is Memorial Day. Alpine veterans will hold their annual inspiring observance of this sacred day to remember those who fought in all US wars. Three organizations take part; Veterans of WW1, The VFW and the Fleet Reserve Assn. Viejas Indian Post will take part.

Cdr. Bert Fuller, USN retd., who conceived the idea of the memorial when he headed the VFW three years ago, will be emcee. Cdr. Perry Welch of the WW1 barracks, is in charge with Sam Hanson as committee chairman.

To see this service is a moving thing in the life of an American. It will start at 11. the hour the Armistice (Veterans' Day), was signed in France on Nov. 11. 1918. The Rev. John Amundsen will give the invocation. At the close, a bugler will sound Taps.

Had these servicemen not engaged in battle, this country might not today be enjoying the highly valuable freedoms it has. At Armistice, Ameirca had 4, 447, 000 men in its armed forces. Many were to be killed, to be on duty 24 hours a day, seven days a week, to be shot at and gassed, or to be blown out of the ocean, or to live a life of hell in cramped rat and cootie infested trenches.

To those whose hearts beat with the red blood that Old Glory's crimson represents, Memorial Day is not one on which is just go picnicing, or to the races, or to sleep; it is a day to remember and be thankful for. -CI



Genial but authoratitive Sheriff Jos. C. O'Connor, whose 24 years' experience in law enforcement with an out standing performance, including nine years as SD County deputy sheriff and 12 years as chief of police in EC. seems destined for reelection, say his committee.

One of his chief accomplishments was the new search and rescue division with aircraft, para-medics, horsemen, 4-wheel drive units, communications and bloodhounds. Another air facility was his air transport system for prisoners that has cut costs 40%, savingabout \$17,000 annually.

"Yes, we'd like to see Alpine get an air strip", he told the Sun this week, "for we could base our planes there when in emergency arises in the back country; also it would be invaluable for bombers in fighting forest fires, the fact that we could take off many days when it is fogged in below".

O'Connor has studied hard for position, in administration, and management, police sciences, and many other subjects including traffic. He has state teaching credentials, is a member of the faculty, SD City College and other schools. He served as gunner in the Marines, and otherwise has fitted himself for the position of heading the county sheriff's department. He is married, has three sons.
