

"Caveat Emptor" is an old adage meaning "Let the buyer beware".

That applies today to these high percentage interest credit sales where a buyer may pay as high as 100% interest on a loan for car, washer, swimming pool or what have you.

That fine daily, the Christian Science Monitor, recently ran a feature on the Illinois "Credit Game". It told how one angry auto buyer in desperation, when he couldn't pay the high carrying charges, lost his car and they wanted him to pay what was still owing, shot and killed two persons in a Chicago motor firm.

Of course the deals are all perfectly legal, but, as Lincoln once said, "It may be legal, but that doesn't make it right".

These excessive rates are plain usury and the rising trend in loans is not helping general business. Last year bankruptcies in the Chicago area climbed to 10,603, and are booming around the US.

Massachussettes recently put through a bill to allow contract signers a "cooling off" period, and Illinois is considering a similar one. Perhaps real business would benefit if all states made it legal for a contract signer to have a week in which to weight the matter. Thus he might not live beyond his means and be forced to go broke, thus wasting money that might be wisely spent for needed things bought through legitimate business firms. -CI

Outdoor lovers will find many attractions, campers and house trailers, swimming pools and patios and--. but you must see it to enjoy it all!


