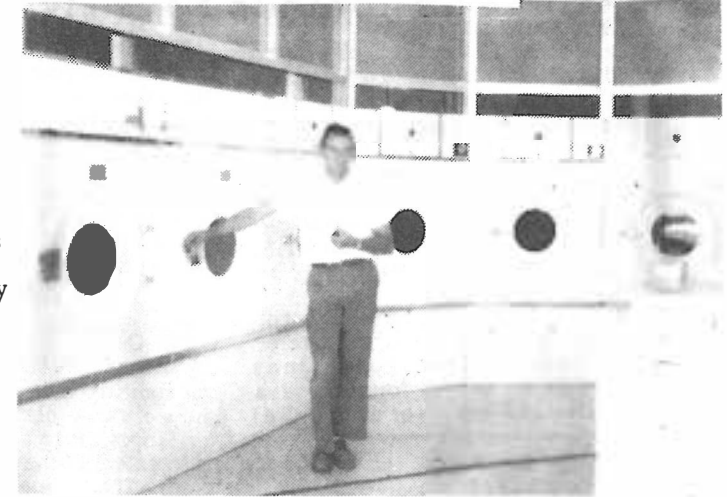
## New Realty Salesman

## Young England in Navy

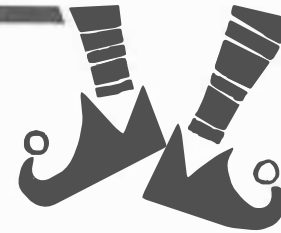

In order to get the thing started, donations or sponsors are needed as it takes \$1200 for a beginning team. This money is used for equipment, uniforms, organization charges and incidentals.

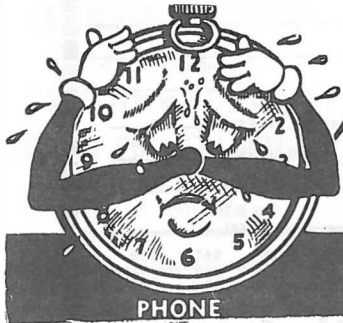

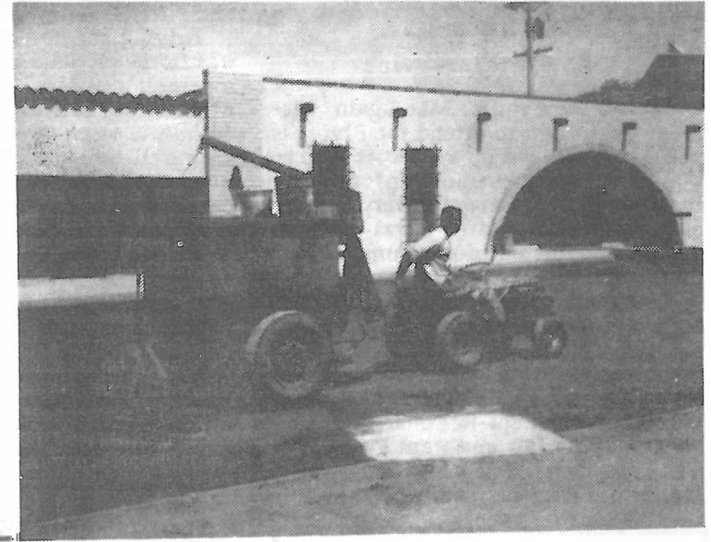

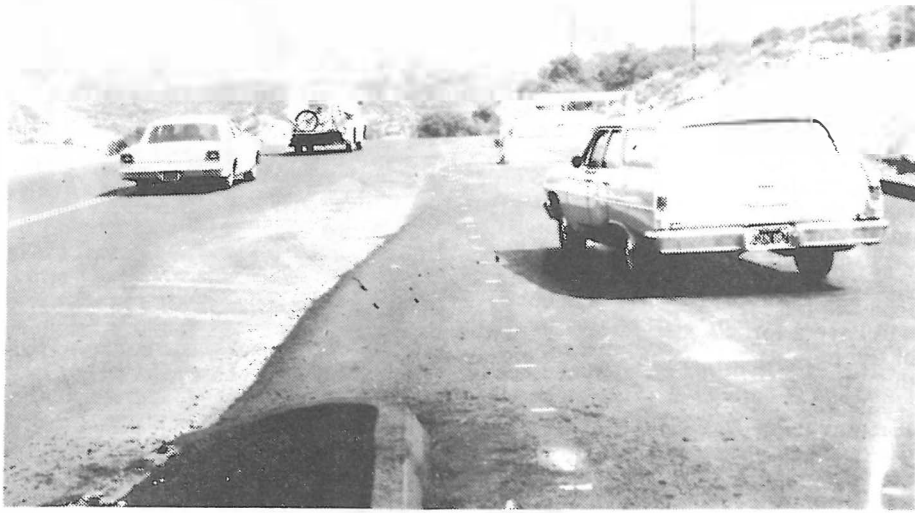

### PAPER WORK DELAYS FREEWAY

The mass of details and paper work in getting bids for the Alpine section of Interstate 8, is the reason that they will not be called for till November, the state highway engineer's office says.

The budget is OK, and everything is sliding into place with the many details of this final section which brings Alpine a clear freeway down to Interstate 5 (Old 101).

Contractors will need another 30 days to figure all the costs as this is the worst section because of grade, hills and rock, an unknown quantity, and much earth must be moved to make many fills.

thing, and that is careful handling. Their outstanding characteristic is their inability to withstand hot temperatures such as we use in cooking. Therefore when we boil, bake, roast, fry, stew or broil foods we are destroying all enzymes. In fact, they are so delicate that destruction occurs at 118 degrees and by 133 degrees the food life is gone. Manufacturing of food ruins the life force in it. For example, milk, cheese and butter do not contain enzymes because the temperature for pasteurization must be around 144 degrees. The same thing happens to canned fruits, juices and vegetables.
