Carriso Gorge Excursion Idea Sidetracked

Undoubtedly one of the most spectacular sights in the world is the famous but seldom seen Carriso Gorge above Jacumba.

We were like many other San Diego county folks, pained to learn this week that the idea of a group of prominent San Diegans whose idea is to start excursions, was derailed by the SD & Eastern Arizona railway. owners and operators. 'The scenic section is perched on 14 trestle and goes through 17 tunnels while descending the gorge from the high point of 3660 ft. to below sea level on the Imperial Valley floor.

This unusual railroad cost \$4 million to build by John D. Spreckles, was opened in 1919, took twelve years to build. One of the trestles, the highest wooden railway bridge in the world, supplanted the first tunnel which col-







Horse Talk






