Will Decline of Morality Wreck America?


If you think all is well with this nation, you should tune in Radio 860, XEMO, and hear what Melvin Munn of Washington, DC., has to say on his thought-provoking Life Line broad cast every day.

Recently he had one on Morality, which sparked this editorial, much of which we have pondered for some time. He points out that the decline of morality is an ancient complaint of wise and righteous men. As often as it has been repeated, that complaint is

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usually well-founded.

Mum says "A new nation is often launched with high and sincere resolutions. The standard of morality at the beginning is high. Gradually, eroded by evasion and doubt, it declines; more and more people stop trying to live up to it".

From only 1950 to 1965-- just 15 years-- we can trace this moral decay in many areas, he believes. In 1950 rarely was profanity permitted in the movies. Now hardly one is without it. Also, mildly indecent scenes could create a furore; today the most shocking spectacles are filmed with hardly a word of complaint.

Likewise books, some ancient, some new, which Americans wanted no part of are now available to all, regardless of age, sex or position. The US has become the world capital of printing and distribution. Even in what should be good fiction, indecency exists to a shocking degree.

In the popular music of the past few years there has been nothing produced of a fine, inspiring or lasting nature, just drivel, trite, and of pornographic nature, in both lyrics and melody with the brain-deadening African beat.

This is something for sober-minded Americans to ponder; it is frightening to say the least. Perhaps God, righteousness, ethics, morals and a few other refining things are dead, dead that is for some people which is perhaps why so many juveniles are sadly off the track, -CI


Horse Talk

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






DR. H.A. BALL

Graveside service was Friday at Mt. Hope Cemetery in SD for Howard A. Ball, M.D., 61, former Alpine longtime resident at Rancho Metate, Tavern Road. He lived at 604 Prescott in EC. He died on the Wednesday from a heart attack.

Dr. Ball was a noted pathologist and cancer researcher, and former president of the SD County Medical Society in 1954. In 1960 he served as Grand Jury foreman, in 1956 was chairman of the Greater SD Science Fair.

He was born in Rutland, Vt. He had received an American Cancer Society grant in 1955 for \$2300 for his project on rats for surgery to curb tumors. Again in 1956 he was awarded \$4400 by the state branch of the society for further cancer research. He claimed to have retarded malignent tumors in rats by using modified sugar.

Survivors, besides his widow Elizabeth; three sons, Newton, of Claremont, Franklin, of Lemon Grove and John William of Los Angeles; two daughters, Mrs. Olive Woldridge of Alpine and Mrs. Mary De Jonge of San Gabriel, and his mother, Mrs. Mary Ball of Santee.

W.W. Gamble Honored

A justly proud Alpiner is back from a 15-day. 3100-mile vacation drive in his camper to New Mexico and Texas, where he was guest of honor at a VF.W session. He was given a plaque which he holds in the photo, with a car insignia. Engraves on the plaque: "Presented to W.W. Gamble Aug. 1, 1966 by John D. Gamble Post 8874, VFW

Los Alamos, N. Mexico." and within the plastic bubble below is "A chip of trinitite from first atomic blast."

"That a scarce and valuable souvenir" says Gamble, for whose brother, Lieut, Gamble of the N.M. National Guard, it was named. He died aboard a Japanese prison ship in Tokyo Harbor in Feb. 1945. He was only 42. had been an attorney in Santa Fe, was sent with the guard to the Philippines in Aug. 1941, before Pearl Harbor. He was taken prisoner just before the Bataan Death March, suffered much with his men which he had valiantly led in their vicissitudes. The post had said he was a great leader of men and a morale builder, giving up his own things and sneaking them to his men, most of whom died there.

After the presentation, Gamble drove into Texas, visiting friends, saw the Balmorhea State Park where a spring-fed pool yields 26 million






gallons a day! It is the largest outdoor swimming pool in the world, remains at 76 degrees all year around.



ALLEN PLANS HOUSEWARMING




