Final Survey on Freeway

Engineers for the state have been winding up their work of establishing elevation marks for a new elevation of the freeway down the grade to Peutz Valley Road. This is being done so contractors can inspect the terrain before bidding. Their estimates are exacting and must be gauged by eleva-

tion marks through the rugged terrain.
The highway engineer's office says bids should be called for by year's end, then the huge task of estimating has to be accomplished before bids canbe submitted for the last part of the freeway to the Willows Interchange. Completion is about two years away.

burying wires and cables.

Foreman B.F. Harris, on the job for Sim J. Harris co., contractors (no relation), told the Sun they are using 6-way concrete "condex". He has a crew of 10 men and machines to do the job. It will remove lines from across Peutz Valley Road, where the big bridge is to carry the freeway across the creek. About 3/4 mile of surface wires and cables will be underground.







CONSTIPATION--

In all cases which are clearly functional in origin or are the result of slight mechanical interferences, regular adequate evacuation should be reestablished by regulation of the diet, insistence on hygienic measures and exercises, and cessation of the use of drugs.... Massage of the abdomen is invaluable, especially for atonic constipation.

Whole wheat bread, cooked and raw vegetables, raw fruits and nuts should

be included in the diet.

From an article in College and University Business "Constipation usually occurs in normal persons whose dietary bulk is far less than it should be and whose fluid intake isn't adequate Constipated individuals studied had a daily fluid intake of $2\frac{1}{2}$ pints. constipated patients used on an average of $3\frac{1}{2}$ pints of fluid daily".

To summarize: Establish a regular time for defacation which can be observed without hurry, anxiety or strain. Omit refined and processed foods and eat plenty of raw, natural

fruits and vegetables.
