Elderly Caught in Social Security Bind!

A senior citizen sent me a marked copy of the SD Labor Leader for Sept. 9, with a thought-provoking story by Sidney Margolius: "Doctors are Charging the Elderly More".

We have no gripe about SS or the MD's. We think both are doing the best they can, but-- some bugs should be worked out.

Briefly, the writer points out that elderly people who had long waited for Medicare to help solve their health expense problems found that

some anticipated benefits may be cancelled by rising fees for them.

He reports one woman, who pays \$3. monthly for benefits, as having now to pay \$10. for an office visit instead of a previous \$7. Some reveal jumps from \$5 to \$10, specialists going from \$10 to \$15.

Fees went up last spring, the medicos evidently getting ready for Medicare. They claim they are merely eliminating cut rates previously given moderate-income oldsters, now that Medicare helps pay bills.

One bind is that doctors can insist on the paient paying the fee himself, thus saving paperwork. One angle is that this plan helps the physician avoid the restriction of "reasonableness" on how much he can charge. Example:a doctor may ask \$350 for an operation, but the law allows the Administration to consider that a reasonable fee should be \$250.

"In that event" writesMargolius, "Medicare then takes the disappointing path of private ind emnity insurance, p aying only (part of the bill, with doctors usually charging more than the fee allowed by the insurance policy".

One person on Medicare told me that "Doctors charge \$25. just to get you admitted to a hospital",

The sad part is that "total medicalcare costs have gone up over 4% in the past 12 months, compared with 2.8 for the full living cost index", the Labor Leader writer concludes.

Perhaps we all should study how to live and eat for better health so as to avoid sickness! -CI



Cathy Dyer left last Thursday to enroll in LaVerne College. She will live on the campus and is studying to be a teacher.



"We will make the buildings fit into the mountain- western theme of the community", Fr. Satrang said. When in operation it will have quite a number living here. 
