






Pilot Williams, left, with passenger, Tom Craig.





# Fire Board Planning Improved Protection

Alpine Fire Commissioners at their September meeting voted to promote a house-numbering program in the district which in some cases would involve naming streets, as a means of improving fire protection.

Commissioners and firemen are anxious to improve the district's protection by cutting down lapse of time between the alarm and arrival of equipment at the scene.

As it now stands, each fireman driving a truck must know each location, or lose precious time in finding his way to the fire. At present, mail route boxes are his only guide, whereas if buildings are numbered the person giving the alarm would give the street and number. The person receiving the call would inform the firemen of the location.

Alpine has already been assigned street numbers and any resident without one can write Elmer Macy, Building Inspection Dept. 206 County Admin istration Center, 1600 Pacific Hwy, SD or phone 239-7711, Ext. 432.

The assessment number on the tax bill is necessary to obtain the information.

<sup>N</sup>ote- After a 2-year campaign with the county, a project of the Sun, house numbers were assigned to all homes and businesses, plus the naming of all county roads. The county will not post private roads; but the fire board may be able to get this done, which would be fine. Unless you have a PO map, it is almost impossible to locate anyone by a mailbox number. -Ed.

## Former Opera Star Visits

The brillian career of an operatic singer, one of eight dramatic sopranos in the world, was suddenly chopped short by an awful bus accident in 1959 when Stephanie Maeabelle Racette was badly injured at Lyman, Wyo.

She has been an avid bus tour fan ever since age 14 when she started singing and touring. For a month she was in a nearly full body cast at a SaltLake City hospital, recovered, but with one limb shorter, and internal dislocations that stopped her forever from giving enjoyment to thousands with her melodious voice.

She has lived for two years in Vista, where she returned Friday after a fortnight at Tappy's Motel where she was interviewed by the Sun, as shown in the photo.


