

She pointed out that if one looks around he will see a steady erosion of past principles of decency and good taste. She did not infer that she was for censorship, but of course some is required.

The censorship point arose the week before in San Francisco over an entry in the film festival, of which she was a director, which triggered her resignation, as she explained, over sadness rather than outrage or disgust over the picture.

She remarked that "it is a melancholy thing to witness (on film) what I regard as the debasement of childbirth and sex", referring to the film in question "Night Games", made in Sweden.

This case is but one facet of the slowly degenerating morals of the day, mirrored in not only some films, but on radio and TV, in songs and plays, also in books-- even the press-- where more vulgar words are apparent than ever, and "leg art" is still a must for press photographers. 

'Yes on 2' Looks Sure

When Gov. Brown and Ronald Reagan plus many organizations including the PTA, are for a measure on the Nov. 8 ballot, it seems that it should be voted in, and that is the status of the \$230 million bond issue, Proposition 2.


It would sluice over \$40 million in new facilities for expansion of UCSD and State colleges, says Norman Foster, ad executive, chairman of a countywide "Yes on 2" committee. Both houses of the legislature approved it without opposition.

Cost per person is low, only $49 \phi a$ year, he points out, for the 25- year bonds, and local property taxes would not be involved. Finances would come through income, sales and excise taxes. State growth and urgent need for school expansion makes this an expedient must.




"Reservations must be made one week in advance" he says, "as we expect a pretty big crowd." His phone is 445 9572.

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
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
