


County Adds Pierce Roads





County-wide endorsement for passage of Prop. 2 on Tuesday indicates that the bond measure will be amply supported, reports Norman B. Foster, chairman. Citizens Committee for "Yes on 2".

"Its passage" he declares, "will insure continued growth at UCSD and State College, guaranteeing space. for many students, who, otherwise, might be denied admission".

He adds that they are receiving "across-the-board endorsement of this crucial proposition which would assure \$40 million in new construction for the two campuses here".

In addition to Brown and Reagan, educators, chambers of commerce, and just about every organization is endorsing the \$230 million measure which would keep the state going ahead in education. Local property taxes are not involved; bonds would be financed by state levies.

So we are thankful to you for all that you've done In the far flung fight for freedom: Though battles were lost, the wars may be won. And for fighting communism since Panmunjom.




