

Local School Does OK Without U.S. Aid!

The idea that this country needs less government is being shown right here in Alpine, federal dictatorship, that is. For the school district last year declined an application for a federally financed program in languagearts. Trustees told administrators to design a program for consideration.

Principal Leo Ryan went to work on it, presented the program to trustees who authorized it for grades one

through three. All who have studied it, like it, and the county is filming it for introduction at a national education conference next year.

Under the federal plan only 2% of students would benefit, while in the local program, 100% are benefitting, Ryam states. The local district has financed it all, about \$6,000 being spent.

Design is to develop all language skills, including reading, writing, speaking and listening. Equipment includes tape recorders, players, listening posts for four pupils, film strips and projectors.

The whole program is set up by the teachers, is put on with aid of higher graders who help teachers, giving them extra learning. Thus primary students get much more attention than otherwise.

Credited with success in this grassroots educational endeavor are Supt. Paul Clay, school trustees and Principal Ryan. Maybe the Alpine plan will spread around the country!-CI

Honors for El Cap Band






Closure has been on since July l. Rainfall has ranged from a low of 1.22 in the northern parr to 2.5 around Descanso.


DOUBLE TALK



Bob, a graduate of Brooks School of Photography, Santa Barbara, went east last year when an opening with Krums Photographic was offered him.


Lynne is a sophomore in college, majoring in interior decorating. Both will continue with their education as Bob is aiming for his Masters in photo.

All local artists are invited to bring their work to display and Mrs. Smith asks that the items be brought on the 22nd between 10 and 1 so that they can be properly displayed.


