



Hibbard, 22, enlisted nearly two years ago. He now regards Alpineas home, will spend his Christmas leave here

He was in the middle of the ship when the blaze roared into forward passageways and compartments with choking smoke engulfing the entire vessel. Hibbard was part of a crew of 400 who battled the flames. Others routed comrades from their bunks, dumped bombs into the sea and performed other important duties.

Sailors working in the boileroom, five decks down, experienced great trouble breathing in the dense smoke.

There was a note of sadness as the ship edged towards the pier with the realization that 44 crewmen and pilots had lost their lives.
