## US Moral Decay Aided by Obscene Matter.

Because Proposition 16 was defeated does not mean that voters have solved this distressing, nay, frightening problem; obscene material in books, magazines and movies.

Čalifornia is the largest producer and distributor of pornographic literature of the most degrading type, a survey showed prior to election. It reported that most of this type of matter winds up with children, which contributes to increase in crime, delinquency, immorality, unwed mothers, divorces, abornions, etc., for it tends to destroy all sense of moral responsibility, and respect for the rights of others.

In 1939, J. Edgar Hoover said "Filthy literature is the great moron-maker that is creating criminals faster than jails can be built to house them." The California situation tends to confirm his words.

For his work of 20 years in the U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service, Edmond A. Wayrynen of Japatul






## **Awards Banquet Thursday**


# DOUBLE TALK




