






Besides all the news and photos of current events, people and so on, the Sun tries to serve the community in every way possible.

Two or three times a year it releases its original "Yellow Pages", business directory of the town. It compiled the first map of the area and published it free, being on sale now at only $lo\phi$. The chamber of commerce and some realtors buy the maps to give out. Another map it printed was the freeway through Alpine, which will be augmented soon with the latest stretch from the highway office.

An nually, in cooperation with the US Weather Bureau the Sun publishes the weather summary, with history of Alpine station, a valuable record for all to keep. This also is free and is given to the weather office for distribution. All to help Alpine.





DISSENTER ON FLUORIDATION


It had been reported that Lake side Kiwanis Club unanimously request directors of local water districts to consider fluoridating drinking water.





Winery Built in 1895 is Famed Landmark

Few residents are probably aware that a winery flourished here from 1895 until enactment of Prohibition. It was built by the late Capt. George P. Brabazon who came from Ireland. His son, Montague, now an Alpine rancher on Willows Rd. was born in the house on the premises.

The winery building remains in the rear of the same home now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Homer A. Spear some what secluded from the road at 2115, Arnold Way by the late Harold L. Flegal who shifted his attention to making grape juice when the 18th amendment was adopted and after



Repeal never reverted to making wine. Grape juice operations ceased in

1950 when Flegal sold, what was then a ranch, to the Spears. Montague Brabazon recalls that

"there were once vineyards covering 20 acres adjoining the winery. Grapes were also purchased from growers in this area."

Alpine's climate is ideal for growing grapes but there are now no vineyards.

Mrs. Flegal, 86, now resides in Lakeside. She fondly recalls the days she and her late husband spent in Alpine: "People from all states in the union bought wine at our ranch. We had an office but we enjoyed meeting people and invited many into our home."

"The house then had a porch on three sides under which were the presses and two grinders covered by




boards. There was a faucet at the bottom of the presses and the juice was hauled to the winery in heavily-1 a den buckets. Following fermenation, the wine was placed in solid oak 50-gallon barrels."

Tacked to the wall of the winery are business and professional cards left by visitors. A faded poster extolls the virtues of muscatel and zinfindel. There are also quotations from the late Elbert Hubbard and a picture of Charles A. Lindberg who made the first solo flight to Europe. The Flegals had met the flier at a reception given for him by the SD Sciots, Pryamid No. 32.

The sec ond floor of the winery contains antiques which remain undamaged despite a leaky roof. A loudsounding bell next to the Spear home. was once used as the Alpine fire alarm. Mr. and Mrs. Spear celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1958. They came here of from El Centro where Spear for 43 years had en gaged in the livestock business and general ranching.





Local Weather is Kind to Aged Patients.


The Alpine Convalescent Center, atop a 300-foot bluff at 2120 Hwy 80 just west of the business section, is the community's largest industry. It has 42 employees, 36 from this area, and a monthly payroll in excess of \$10,000.

The Center is managed by Woodie Mitchell and wife, Patricia, known to many residents as "Pat", who when they were interviewed said!"

⁶We are licensed for 102 beds and 99 patients. We have a 95% occupancy at all times in serving not only as a nursing home for the aged but also for ambulatory and bed patients. We are also licensed by the State Mental Hagiene department, and equipped to provide all types of care. Our rooms are private and semi-private.

"Medical care is available from the guest's own doctor, of from our house physician, Dr. Arvin Klein who is on 24-hour call. Five other doctors are also available. Despite the fact that we are 30 miles from San Diego there is no feeling of isolation".

Five cooks provide "home style" food and special diets. Regarding the purchase of food, Mrs. Mitchell says: "We buy between 750 and 1,000

pounds of fresh meat, spend between \$325. to \$350 for fresh milk and approximately \$150 for fresh vegetables monthly. We also buy about 75 dozen eggs each week. Patients are given the choice of tea, coffee or milk. There are also soft drink machines".

Equipment includes a complete laboratory, x-ray machine and electrocardigraph for testing the heart. George Plikshe is the laboratory technician & Donald H. McCowan makes the x-rays.

There are planned recreational activities and a TV set in the lounge. A number of rooms are provided with TV.

Patients are still working on Christmas decorations under the direction of Mrs. Mary Hanock as part of occupational therapy. Everything is done at the home to make guests feel that they are part of the "family".

Patients come from many areas including LA and the Imperial Valley. About 25% are asthmatics. Woodie says:

"A lot of credit for the success of the home is due to Alpine's climate, good cooperation from the residents, business people and the Alpine Sun. He expressed appreciation for Sunday afternoon services conducted at the home by Alpine's Bethel Assembly of God Church.

Plans for the home were started in 1961 through the cooperation of Dr. John Robuck and Christopher Sickles of SD. They formed Capital Services which owns the seven-acre site and buildings. The Mitchells, who own the equipment and furnishings, operate on a 49-year lease.

The first unit was completed on Aug. 28, 1963 with accommodations for 49 patients: The second structure, completed in 1965. can house 52. Rental space is now available for business and professional people.

Mrs. Mitchell started in 1957 with six boarding patients at 721 Alpine Heights Road, and in 1959, with 14 patients, moved to the Mallicoat (that was her name before she married Woodie), Nursing Home, 2733 Hwy 80



THE AVOCA DO- Our Vegetable Butter Have you noticed how reasonably priced avocados are this year? Growers say they have a "bumper crop", so let's make the most of it.

The avocado is a good source of vitamins A, C. G and outstanding in Bl. It has a high iron content, is 94% digestible and contains 20% fat, so can be used as a natural oil.



ALPINERS COVER 26,000 MILES



When Barney Ratliff, owner of the Log Cabin Cafe, Cocktail Lounge and store came to Alpine from SD in 1947 he was an asthmatic who had difficulty in crossing a street. Thanks to Alpine's unexcelled climate, one would now never guess that he ever had a respiratory problem.

Physicians, who had employed every way to help him, regard his recovery 1/2 as a miracle. Barney purchased the Log Cabin the year he arrived and was able in 1948 to take over its active management.

The tiny cafe was first established in an old trolley car which C.A.

Sherman bought in SD, hauled it to the present site. The Shermans remodeled it a bit before refinishing it in the log cabin style with bark of an oak tree.

The exterior has not had an appreciable change. The interior was later remodeled to its present attractive design. Customers once sat on tree stump stools but they were later re-placed by more comfortable seats.

A deep well at the front, since covered by a sidewalk supplied the town pump and a watering trough. Its moisture now seeps into the oak tree roots whose leafy branches partially shade the Cabin.

This nationally famous cafe, known because "A tree grows up through our roof", was established in 1920 under that sturdy old oak the trunk of which is in the present dining area. Three years ago Editor Irvine asked Ratliff if he knew how old it was. Nobody knew, so Irvine said "Why not let's put on a guessing contest and you give a prize and we'll get a tree surgeon to take a core and read the annual rings".

Ratliff thought it a good idea so the Sun publicized the contest, and a tree expert gave the reading of 207 years, so today its age is 210. Marvin Chynoweth in the name of the Little League here, now of Lakeside, won the prize, a radio, for guessing exactly 207! Roy Caho of SD certified his reading of the core to Paul, Brock, then manager for Ratliff. Marvin also hit 3rd and 10th places while Theresa Hanson was 2nd, with 206 and Red Andrews of the Casino Inn, a 205, and John Bilsky next with 210.

Barney and his wife, Agnes, formerly occupied a house on the site of the present postoffice. The Ratliffs own that building, liquor store and delicatessen adjoining the Log Cabin. He sold property on which the Security First National Bank was built.
