TAVERN ROAD LOSES TREES

For a week Davey Tree Surgery men have been topping many dead eucalyptus along Tavern Road, near South Grade Road. They were using a big "bucket" crane-truck which



operates by hydraulic lift from a "stick" similar to an airplane, in the bucket. The man hoists himself about 30 ro 40 feet to top the tree.

So they would not topple over the wrong way and endanger high voltage lines of SD G & E, the man uses a "throw" line, snags the upper part of the trunk, then runs it down to the men who pull the sawed off part over into the field.

One big leaning tree was so heavy they had to yell for more brawn to pull on the line. Photo shows woodman felling entire smaller tree which was totally dead. Those with life had their dead tops cut off and Monday woodcutters finished felling them all.

The Sun believes that Romney, who is a good Mormon, is correct, when he was quoted" "Now this country would not be as unique as it is-- politically, economically, and socially-- if it weren't for the fact that the Declaration of Independence is essentially 'a religious document."




RAIN HITS MANY CARS


Daughter Marguerite flew out from Kansas City to be with her mother, will return home this week.




Melva and Ron Riley took Skip Beau over to Yuma last week-end and he came home with a Reserve Champion.



HERE IS NEW FREEWAY MAP

Here is map of new Interstate 8 Freeway as shown through Alpine. At left or west is Peutz Valley Road, going under the new pavement. Next is Tavern Road Interchange, with Tavern and Frontage Road going off to west, and southern side going south to give entry to old 80 that will becalled

Alpine Blvd.

Next is W. Victoria Dr., shown passing over freeway which goes on east to E. Victoria which goes underneath to rejoin Alpine Blvd. with a short frontage road to the west.

Finally the Willows Interchange shows how motorists will have access to frontage roads, Willows Road, and the Viejas Reservation to the east.



This means a lot of traffic now entering Hwy 80 via South Grade Rd. and Arnold Way, will go via Tavern Road, which will be shorter and faster than the old routes.



MORMONS TO DEDICATE BUILDING



CARE OF THE BODY

The average American eats entirely too much. There are probably a few people who eat too little but on the average nine out of ten persons overindulge. Most of us eat 3 meals a day plus snacks, and at least one coffee break. This tends to fill the stomach to capacity.

The demand upon the digestive organs is greater than it should be when food is introduced into the stomach before the preceding meal has been thoroughly digested.

People with slow digestion require from 5 to 6 hours to empty the stomach. This is doubly true if hard to digest foods are eaten. It should be remembered that the stomach is a muscular sac which grows weary from working just as any muscle does.

A good rule to observe is to take no food into the stomach if part of the preceding meal remains. The presence of remaining food acts as a ferment and hinders digestion of the following meal.

Eating a little less is also easier on the heart, the diligent never- ceasing worker.


UNUSUAL HONOR FOR MISS NOBLE


