He talks about the continuing series of events the academic community has been bombarded with: civil disobedience, assaults, threats, and riots of unprecedented magnitude.

Last week's events at Sacramento seem to bear out what the director stated, although Gov. Reagan has many supporters of his new policies.

in Oct. 1964: "This academic year will undoubtedly see intensive Communist Party efforts to erect its newest facade (the W. E. B. DuBois Clubs of America) on the Nation's campuses to draw young blood for the vampire which is international communism."

Just a year ago he also warned: "The unvarnished truth is that the communist conspiracy is seizing this insurrectionary climate to captivate the thinking of rebellious-minded youth and coax them into the communist movement itself or at least agitate them into serving the communist cause."

He says we want our young people "to be able to think for themselves and to be active participants in community life, but we also want them to realize that freedom and justice are secured by law and order."

In closing, Hoover explains: "By the same token, the demand of the hour is for educators with courage, dedicated to the supremacy of law, unafraid to support American principles, and determined that the communist conspiracy shall not dictate the policies of free institutions."

Perhaps we all should awaken to these serious warnings of the FBI chief.

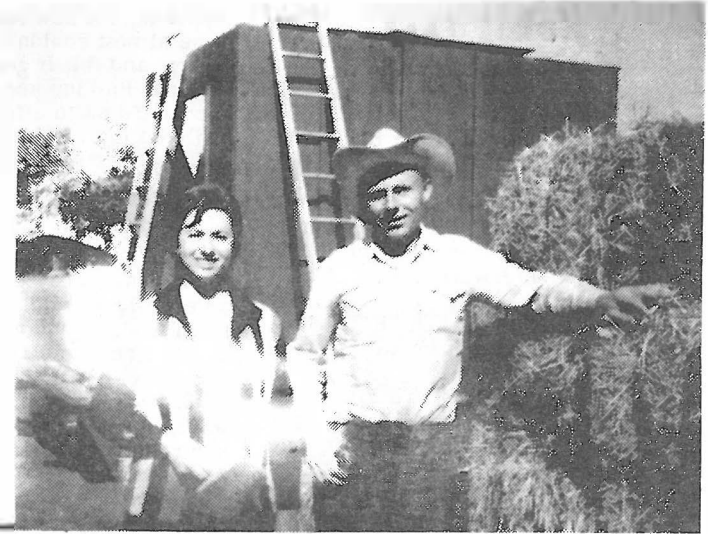

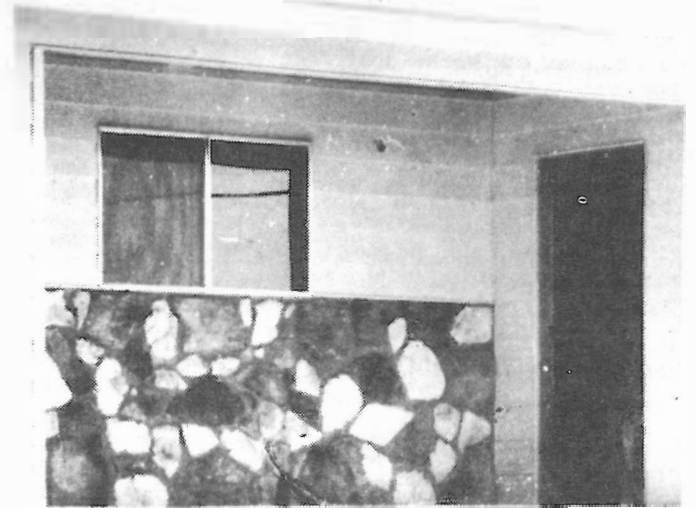

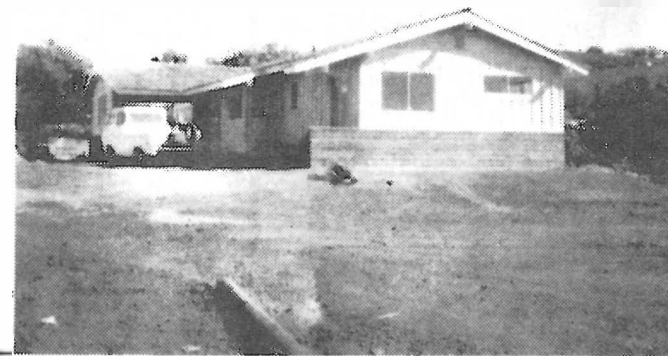
Patricia Presley gets the cast off of her finger next week as it has knitted properly without complications.

No one knowingly would sit down to a meal sprinkled with poisons of various kinds. Yet, many of us consume a variety daily because the agricultural products we buy have been so heavily sprayed with insecticides.

Today, there are many more pesticide poisons on the market and these remain on the food after spraying. Therefore, the necessity of washing all such products very carefully cannot be overemphasized.

One of the most effective methods is to wash all fruits and vegetables first in sal soda, then with running water, then in vinegar, and again in running water.

This method helps a great deal for produce but preservatives are used in all frozen and packaged goods, so it is almost impossible today to get a meal without some kind of poison in it. Unless you grow your own.

of the chamber of commerce Wednesday night in the school auditorium when President Robt. Burak introduced Dr. Carl C. M. Gregory, (Ph.D. LLd.) a nationally known Economist-Consultant, of Beverly Hills and Washington D. C., who explained details, answered questions.

"We are not selling you anything" he explained, "but came quietly here, obtained the land, and have no stock to sell".

It has taken all this time for the government to approve the purchase and conclude details of the 50-year government loan in perpetuity. He did not disclose which federal agency will handle the money. That and the names of the 7 trustees - 5 from Alpine and 2 from the organization, will be divulged soon.

Sale was handled by Anna Jerney of Alpine Realty Co. Escrow will be in Security-First National Bank, Beverly Hills. First funds will be deposited in Security's local branch in about two weeks.

There will be a resident manager, preferably from Alpine, who will live in one of the units. Building should start in 60 days, with completion 4 months later.

The location is a well known landmark, Spear's Cottages on 3 acres, 2115 Arnold Way at Olivewood Lane,

formerly owned by H. L. Flegal, and built by Capt. G. P. Brabazon in 1895. See the Sun's Christmas issue, 1965 for story with photos by Bill Lucas.

The old winery will be restored and used as a recreation spot for residents who will also enjoy other activities.

The speaker told how the parent organization was started in 1963 as the Desert Arthritis & Rehabilitation Center, a non-profit charity, not a medical body. The name is being changed to the Highland Housing League, Inc., working under the Heritage franchise which earns 5% for handling details.

"When the 41 units are leased - 1 and 2 year terms - 41 more will be built", he added. They have others in the state and in the midwest, with about 18,000 tenants. It will be called Heritage Alpine Housing, Inc., and will be given a TV network newscast, showing some of the bachelor and 1-bedroom apartments.

"As there are no dividends, residual funds will go to charity in this community", he added. "All units will be modern, all-electric, with air-conditioning, insulation, wall-to-wall carpets, completely furnished, even linens, and rents will be \$42.50 per month including taxes, utilities. Eventually small houses will be built to sell for less than \$12,000."

Dr. Gregory told the Sun how he came upon Alpine as a location: "Three years ago some citizen of Alpine saw me on a TV program at one of the Heritage projects, wrote me about your location and fine climate so I came, saw, liked it and started working".

Note - As we noted in our first story; "Alpine's economy looks like it's on the rise". Now let's work for a veterans' hospital! -CI
