# EDITORIAL



## Could this tragedy have been averted?

A startling letter has just been received from one of our subscribers, Hamilton Hassinger, who happens to be my oldest friend from Ocean Park when we came from Oregon in 1903.

First, his letter: "Hi Clarke" Mother and I were in the building which one bomber crashed into at Leisure World (Laguna Hills), Jan. 22, and immediately burst into a flaming inferno. A marine burst our door open and carried Hazel out with me following just ahead of already flaming carpets, draperies, etc. Without the Marine's help, I could not have carried her out and it is a miracle we were not injured from the crash. We are now at our son's place in La until further notice, so please send the Sun there".

A strange coincidence of this tragedy is that my cousin, Dr. Adrian Irvine, retired physician from Hubbard,

Ohio, witnessed the crash and fire, was quoted in the AP story: "No one had a chance, I looked out a window and saw a mass of flames engulf the buildings".

The planes, coming in to land at El Toro, collided in a rainstorm, killing Marine Capt. James Powell and four residents of the housing.

The report said that although El Toro is some 5 miles from the 3600 acre housing, Leisure World lies squarely in the instrument approach part of the airstrip.

The housing was built over objections of the Department of Defense, but a compromise in 1962 permitted the Ross Cortese firm to go ahead by agreeing to reserve a half-mile strip touching the air structure for nonresidential use. The two structures destroyed-- where my friend lived-- were adjacent to the half-mile strip. We think the government and the company made a grave mistake; more might have been killed and it could happen again.

Still another coincidence is that in 1909 Hassinger and I, both auto mechanics and drivers, were intensely interested in flying, built an all-steel monoplane, brazing every rib and spar in spare time at night. My parents became so frightened that I would kill myself in the air, they sold me on joining the navy and seeing the world!

So Hassinger finished the plane by himself, flew it, but as it was underpowered, it stalled, crashed and he broke a big toe, never got to fly. Ten years ago this July I took up flying, was soloed at 65 by Al Smith of Gillespie Field (he has a realty office here), and am the oldest pilot in SD County today! -CI

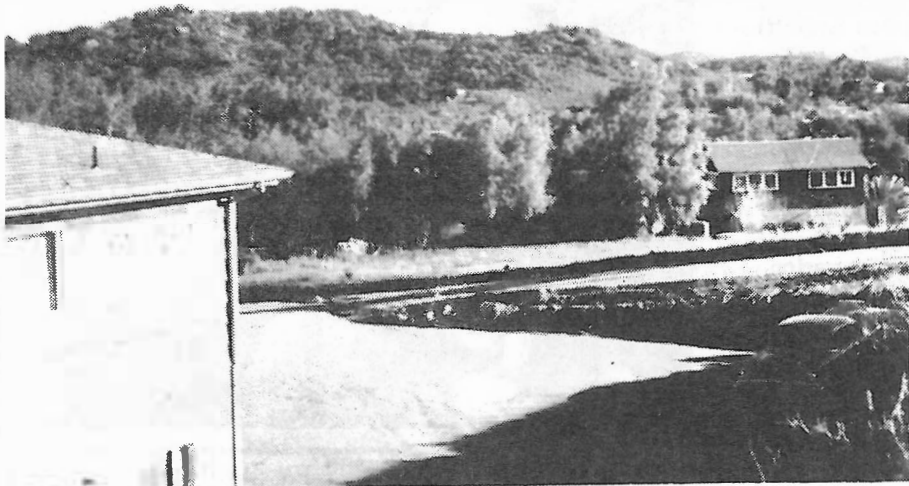

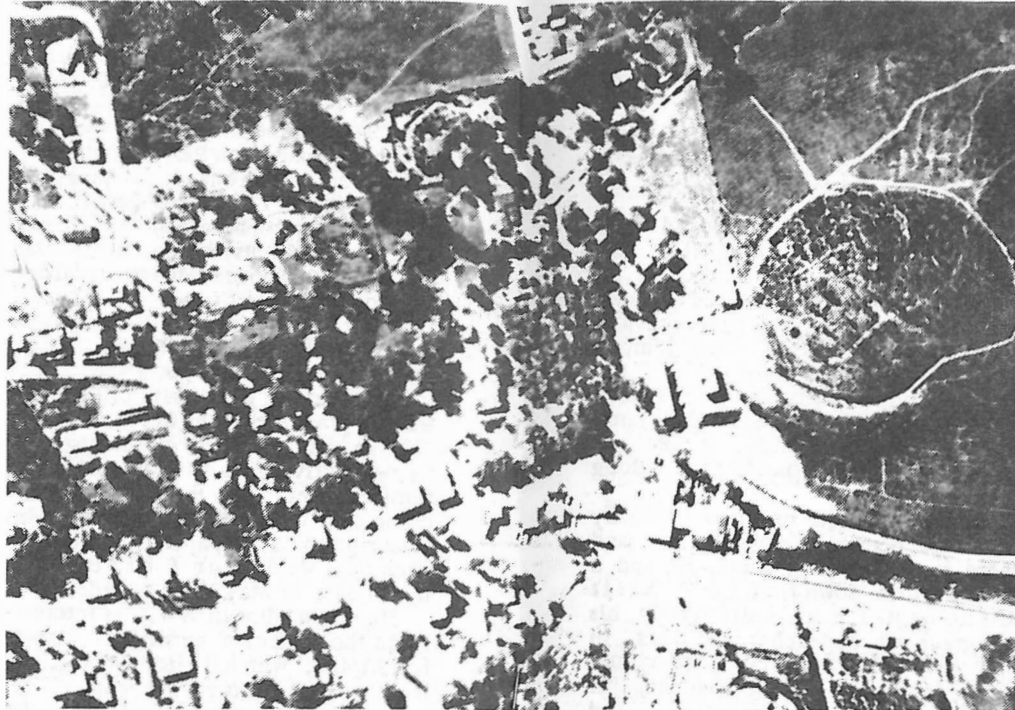

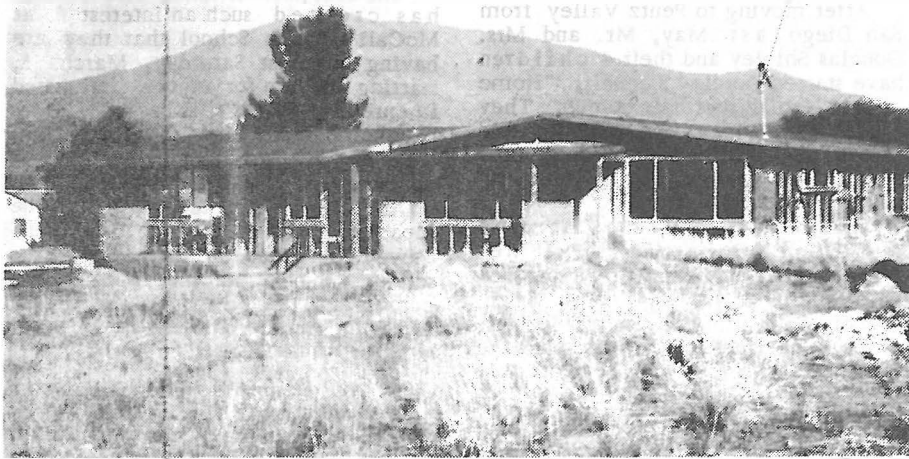

## 'Dead' man is living!

Bert Fuller, Lt. Cdr. USN, retd., Alpine's service officer for veterans' organizations, had a startling surprise the other day. One of his buddies, whom he long ago thought was killed in the Philippines, turned up alive. The man is Harvey Harveston, who was one of 112 radiomen in Fuller's Patwing 10 which had 28 planes with 1100 men.

"There are only four of us left" Bert told the Sun, "so far as I know: John Bilsky and myself, of Alpine, Jim Tate of Escondido, and Harvey". The four hope to hold a reunion here in the near future.

They were in the tragic but brave surrender of Gen. Jonathan Wainright at Corregidor May 6, 1942, Fuller remembers. He was taken prisoner, but escaped to later head up a band of guerillas which did much damage to the enemy till Gen. MacArthur returned.

Al Smith, of Gillespie Field, and a real estater of Alpine, was also a POW in Manila. Bert has written a thrilling diary of his long term as a POW and chief of guerillas, which he hopes to get published someday.

## Ask higher phone rates

Pacific Telephone has asked the PUC for permission to raise its rates to balance a "desperate need" for improved earnings. Increase would net \$158 million annual gross, plus \$23 million for "Yellow Pages" ads.

If approved, 1-party rates for homes in Alpine would go from \$6.20 to \$7.75 monthly. Basic business service would rise from \$17.80 to \$20.20.

Reasons: huge construction spending and higher costs, with declining earnings. New construction for 1964-66 went over \$1.3 billion.

Money is needed for improving services, undergrounding facilities, wage and fringe employee benefits and other rising costs. Its 1966 return was only 5.2%, lowest in the US, while it kept rates among the nation's lowest. The firm should have about 8% return.

Any ambulance service here would help the community in many ways besides cutting down on the present exorbitant costs of this service-- as high as \$60. to take a patient to EC.

Robt. Evers has been working on the idea, and the Volunteer Fire Dept., is willing to cooperate. They discussed the matter, including their training & servicing the vehicle, then passed it on to the commission which gave considerable thought to the idea, but concluded that at present, it was not feasible.

One reason is that volunteers cannot be ordered to be available 24 hours, which would be required. Insurance cost is quite high. The men that would man such an ambulance are required to take special training.

### ARE INSECTIDES KILLING US?

On March 14, 1962, the San Diego Union issued a warning to an unidentified motorist, who, as a good Samaritan, rolled to the side of the road two barrels which had fallen off a truck into the highway. In falling, one of the barrels, containing parathion had broken open and police suspected that the man had come into contact with this poisonous insecticide. He was urged to wash his hands immediately and seek medical aid at once. Within two hours after contamination with the skin parathion seeps into the blood stream. One must be especially careful not to inhale this poisonous spray while using it in a garden. Better still-- Don't Use It!

The State of California has in recent years reported over 200 cases annually of accidental poisoning by parathion. Approximately seven million pounds a year are now used in fields and orchards in the US. The largest amount being used in California.

In our endeavor to do away with crop destroying insects we are endangering our own lives.

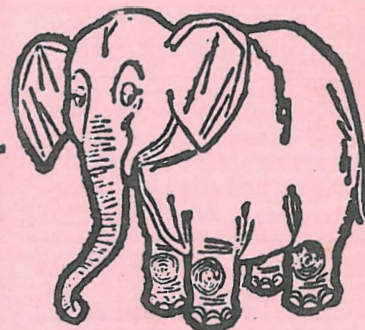
