EDITORIAL

Will we return to the 'good old days'?

Aside from war, America's greatest problem perhaps is air pollution. This may bring us back to the "good old days" of the electric car, which would do away with most of the smog in and around big cities.

The other Sunday, Parade, the magazine in the SD Union, had a fascinating story about the electric car, which is fast being developed by the Yardney Electric Corp., in which the writer, E.D. Fales, jr., took a ride.

When I was a boy I worked in a garage at Santa Monica, drove all those antiques, including Baker, Detroit and other electrics. Of course they were mere coupes with ponderous batteries, for little old ladies who drove them around town.

I always enjoyed driving those old electric show cases for they were smooth, quiet, and clean. England has 20,000 of them in operation today. The experimental one Fales rode in was a converted Renault with four neat air-

craft batteries which zoomed it along at 50 mph with a motor not much larger than a washing machine motor.

You have only two dials, besides speedometer, volts and amps. You turn on a switch, press the "gas", your power accelerator, and away you go, silently, swiftly, smoothly, no gears to shift. You don't have a fast getaway, but you work up to 50 slowly, evenly. This maching goes 77 miles on a charge, by merely plugging in anywhere. But better batteries are coming, which will up the range to 200 miles. Cost is but 10 or 15¢ for 40 to 50 miles.

Upkeep might run up to \$350 every 2 to 5 years for new battery parts, \$75 to \$100 yearly to rent the silver for the battery, but you have no gas, oil and engine and transmission repairs to pay for.

Yardney, Ford and others are working feverishly to perfect the new electric, which for the present will be good for around town and short trips, but long-distance ability will be developed. The first ones may be ready in a couple of years.

Yes, I'd like to go back to those good old days, and I'll put my order in for one right now, like Fales did! -CI
