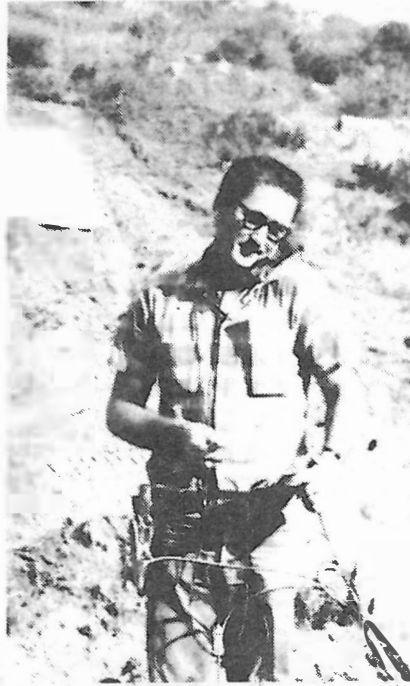

# EDITORIAL

## Traffic toll is a tragedy of errors!

Not because Alpine suffered a fatal auto accident Monday, but as summer arrived Wednesday and vacation is on with many more drivers on the road, it seems meet that attention should be called to the horrible death and maiming toll of traffic.

The Travelers Insurance people in a final report summing up the deaths for 1964, call it a "Tragedy of Errors". The booklet is illustrated with cartoons that make one think.

In that year 48,000 died with 3,840,000 injuries. There were 285,400 pedestrian casualties and more than 1,360,000 from speeding. It is not only drivers, but walkers who cause trouble, for crossing between intersections killed or injured almost 90,000.

More than 87% of the casualties occurred in accidents involving driver violations, and 37% of motorists involved in fatal wrecks were under 25 or over 65.

## RAY FORD

Funeral for Ray Ford, 72, owner and operator of El Capitan Cafe, 1409 E. Main in EC, was Tuesday in Paris Mortuary Chapel, with burial in Alpine Cemetery. He lived with his wife Teresa, who ran the cafe with him, at 570 Grape St. in EC.

He died Friday from heart failure which had brought him to a La Mesa hospital Monday morning. The couple were well known in Alpine as they ran Flinn Springs Cafe from Feb. 1952 till it burned down in Oct. 1956. They have been 9 years at El Capitan Cafe. He had been a star salesman and 3-state manager for Addressograph-Multigraph Co., for 18 years in Cleveland, later had his own business in Akron, Ohio.

His son Leslie Ford, and Mrs. Ford's sister, Mrs. Catherine Czatlicke, of Akron, were here for the funeral. Ford was a native of Pennsylvania, had lived in the county 15 years, was an Army sergeant in WWI, belonged to the VFW.

Mrs. Ford plans to carry on at the cafe. They have taken the Sun ever since it started, the same date as their taking over the Flinn Springs Cafe.

Other survivors: a son, Edwin Dale, of Pennsylvania and four sisters.

The recent motion picture "The Appaloosa" that featured Marlon Brando used the young Appaloosa owned by Jess R. Gonzales of Lakeside. Margaret sold Blue Admiral after her partner, Eugene Freeland died, and only has a few mares on the ranch here.

We were happy to see the article and sent our thanks to "Our Aunt Mary."

We want to sell her and believe with a little work she would make an excellent pony to pull a cart. She is real quiet and has a sweet disposition. 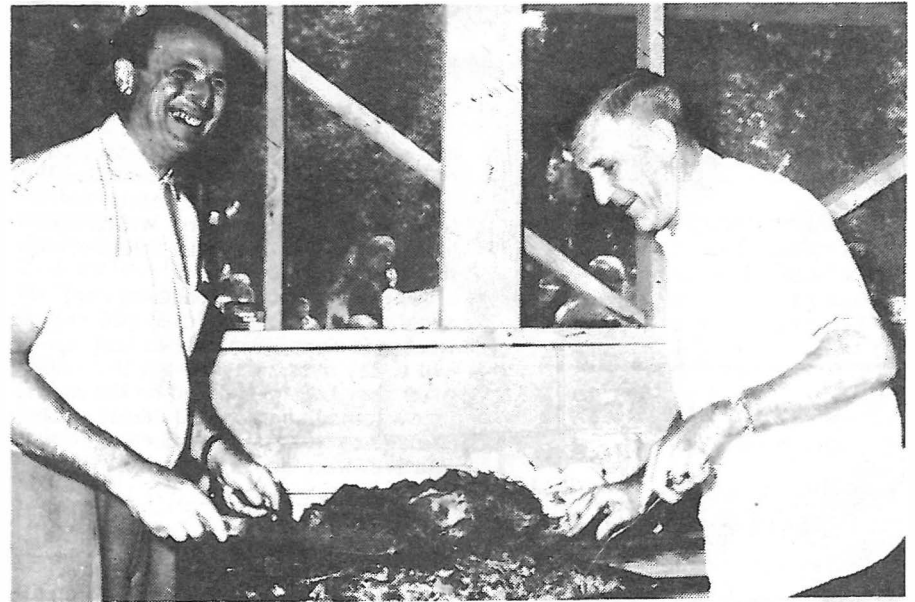

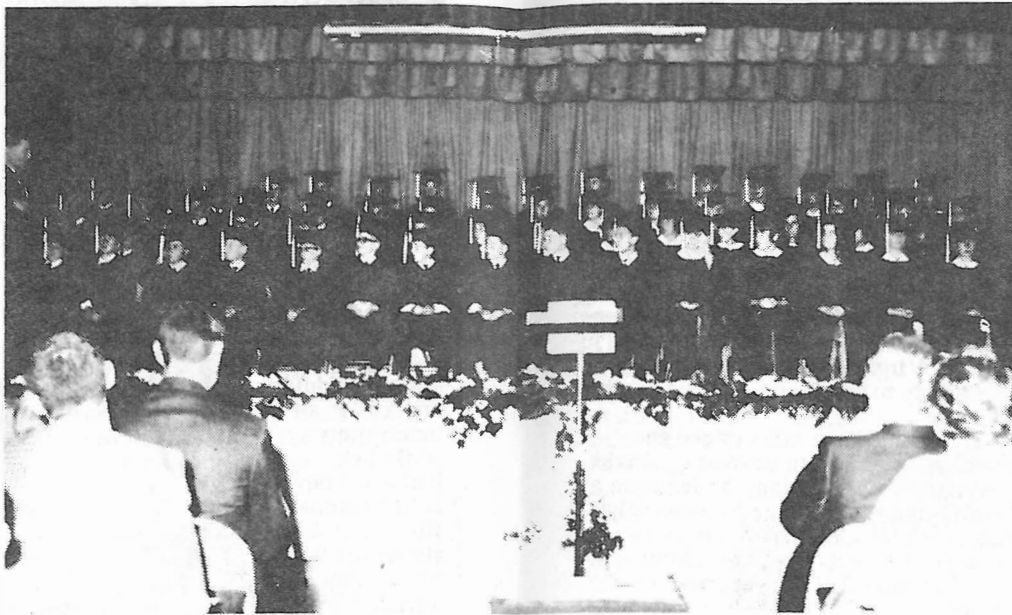

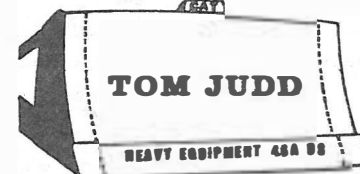
### FOLKS LIKE WESTERN WEAR

### BLOOD CHEMISTRY AND SUGAR

Cont'd. from last week

Dr. Melvin Page goes on to say, "you can point to someone who is healthy and who takes a great amount of sugar in his coffee or someone else who lives on soda pop - one bottle contains 4 teaspoonsful of sugar - and still keeps well. There are exceptions to all rules - and many of us do not begin to pay for our extravagances until later in life. But look at our children and grandchildren. Do they hand down bodies as strong as those which they inherited? Natural sweets such as honey, molasses and maple sugar can be used within reason. They do affect the calcium phosphorous levels, but since they are not pure sweet and do contain essentials of diet, their presence among our foods is not as injurious as refined sugar.

In past generations sugar was not found alone. It always was accompanied by other materials that the body needed.

In every instance where a person has habitually used refined sugar, deficiencies have existed in the other nutritional factors, especially the vitamin B complex. Also when both calcium and phosphorous levels are lower than normal, there is a withdrawal of minerals from the dentin and bone.
