

Red tape hampering teenage employment.

The other day a copy of the Hemet News came across my desk. It was reassuring to see that this daily has the same ideas that the Sun has had for many years, that both state and federal laws have conspired to deprive millions of American youngsters of the right to enjoy in their first job.

The Hemet editor quoted from one of Governor Reagan's recent addresses: "Once upon a time it was easy for a teenager to get a part-time job because it was easy for a merchant or a manufac turer to hire him. But that's

no longer true.

"Rigid minimum wage laws, high union scales, and the mass of paper work involved in withholding taxes, social security, insurance and the rest make it difficult to hire anyone on a part-time basis.

"This is largely a federally-made problem and it's one we'll be lucky if we live long enough to see the federal government solve.

"But if it were possible to hire a kid and pay him out of the day's receipts without going through all the paper work and regulations, a lot more teenagers and students could get jobs."

The editor seconded the Governor's motion. So do we, again. -CI.

YOUR BREATH AND YOU

One of the most natural habits we hardly pay attention to is the habit of breathing- unless for one reason or another we are not getting enough ox-

Breathing is performed by the musclesiof the abdomen and chest, and its perfection is determined by the habits and condition of the organs performing it. Oxygen can be supplied to the blood only in limited quanities if these muscles are badly nourished and incorrectly used.

The amount of work men can perform does not entirely depend on his muscular structure, but on his breathing capacity. If he can breath well he can generally work well. If he is shortwinded working will be an effort and he will tire easily.

A few simple reasons for not breathing well--fixed position in sitting. standing or sitting for a prolonged period of time--worry or anxiety contributing to constrict ion of muscles and thereby causing inability to take in more air. Unhappiness and discouragement creating shallow breathing

Oxygen is absolutely indespensable to the life of every cell in the body. We can do without food and water for days, but only a few minutes without


