Is America world champion in chaos?

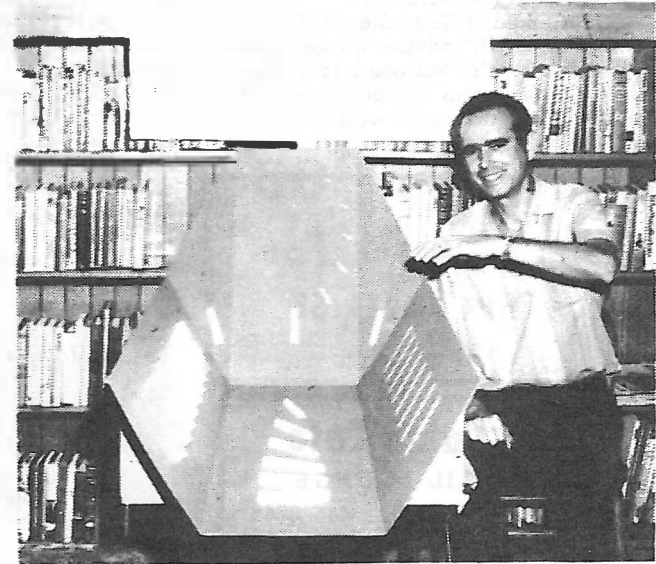


NEW ART EXHIBIT IS UNIQUE

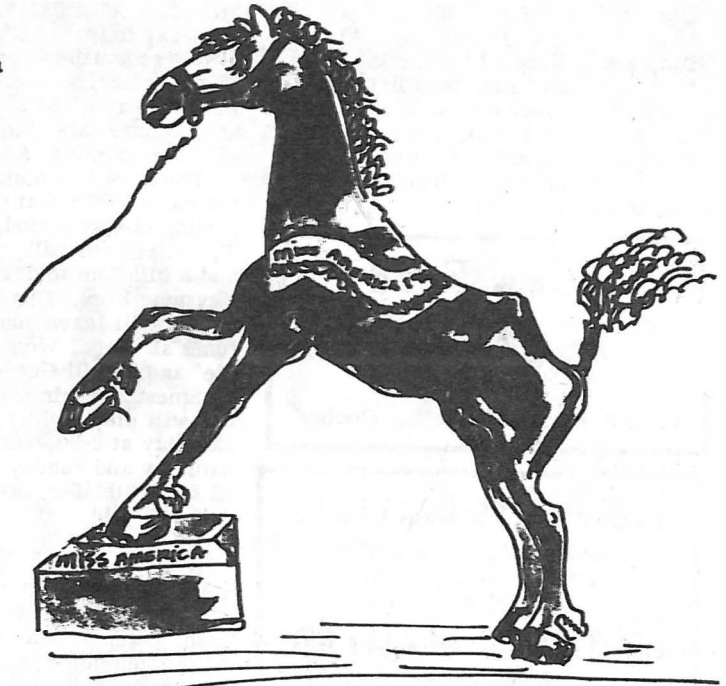

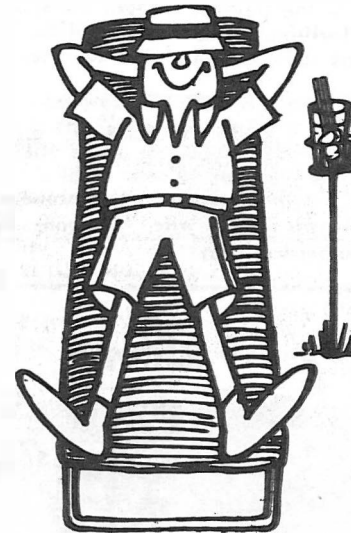

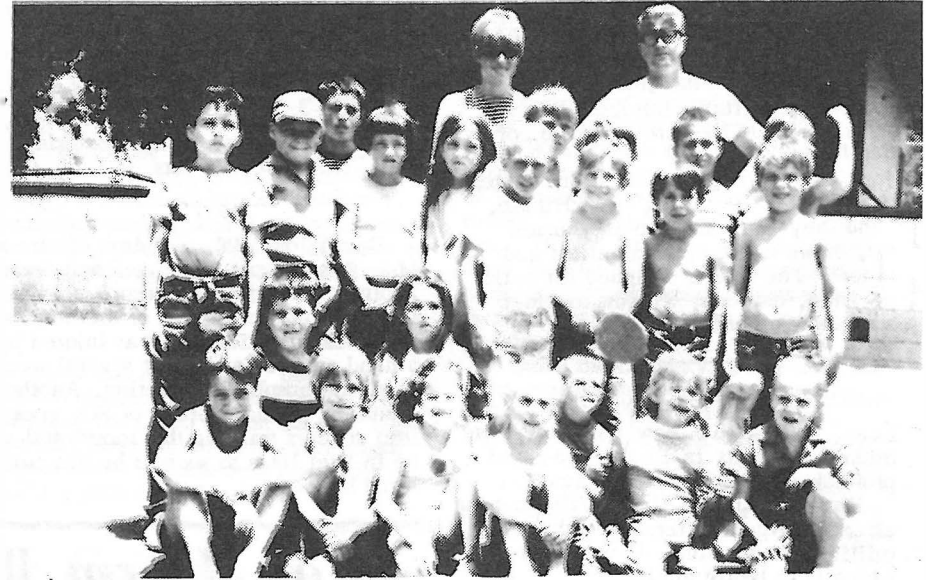

STULL TOLD OF AMERICAN LIBERTY

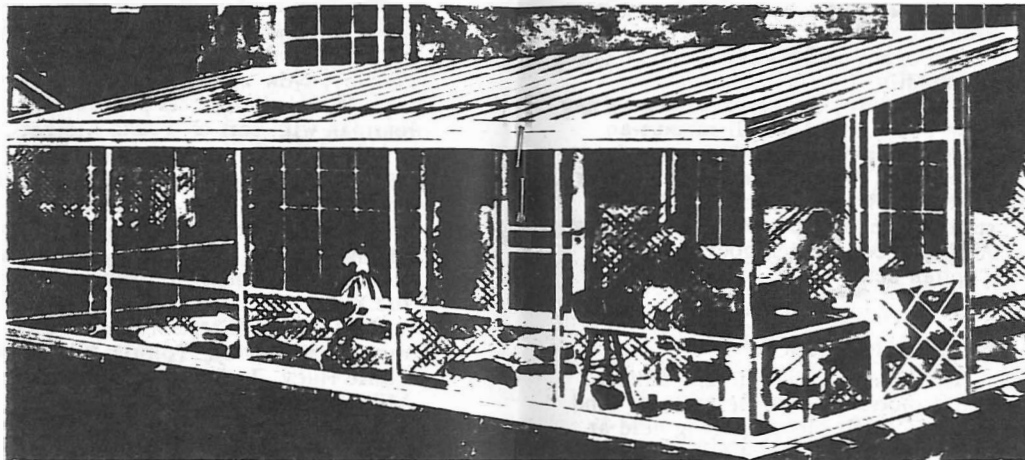

mine. Several of his buddies died. Already 100 pieces have been removed from his legs, one bad cut being 36" long. He had been at the front only 24 months.

This was his second hit, as the first time was on May 26 when a land mine exploded nearby, killing 6 of his group. He sustained a glancing wound, went back to duty later that day. They were on Operation Hickory near the DMZ.

The Crumrines lived here 3 years ago in the Ruis house, Hwy 80 next to Bert Fuller. Rocky attended E1 Cap, later Granite Hills. He enlisted when he was 17, was trained, then went to Okinawa. When he became 18 last March 16, he went to Viet Nam, was wounded June 6. Friends may address him at Bldg. 26-3, B Ward, Navy Hospital, San Diego.

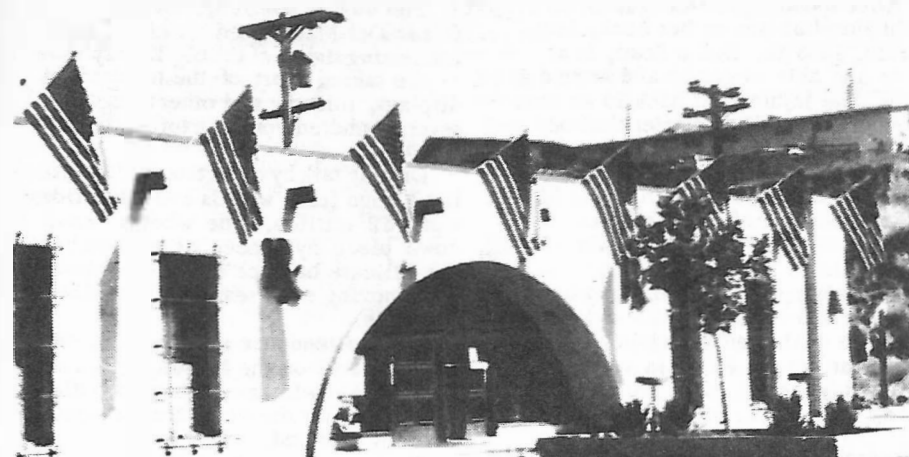
BANANA BONANZA

The banana is one of our most popular fruits due to the fact, perhaps that it is self-contained, having a wonderful protective covering in its unbroken skin.

The banana has high food value with its vitamins A, B1, B6, C, G and riboflavin. The B vitamins are scarce in our usual diet of processed foods. We depend upon these vitamins for the proper bacteria in our intestines, also for maintaining healthy nerves. Vitamin B6- pyridoxine in bananas is equal in value to that of calves liver. In minerals we find potash, sodium, Chlorine, calcium and richness in potassium. The good content of B1 and G makes them wonderful for stimulating the appetite and maintaining health and appearance of skin, hair and eyes.

Bananas are an excellent food for children and should be given to them instead of candy, pastry or sugar. The sugar in bananas is in an easily assimilable form. They are very often the first solid food given to baby and are also used for their anti-diarrheal action.

The International Medical Digest carries an article on the mashed banana treatment for diarrhea in children. The reasons for effectiveness given are that the pectin contained in bananas swells and causes a volume of soft, bland waste material that cleans out the intestines and the kind and number of intestinal organisms are changed favorably because bacteria are absorbed by this pectin and the growth of beneficial bacteria species is promoted. 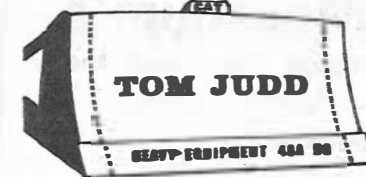
