




INDIANS DANCE FOR RANCH SCHOOL

CARE OF THE BODY

BANANA BONANZA (Cont. from 7/21 About the calories in bananas with which we are so concerned, an average size banana has about 88 calorles only, three more than the gelatin desserts which are famed for their lowcalorie content.

The percentage of fat in them is low and consists largely of the beneficial unsaturated fats, and they contain no cholosterol, a factor which prompts doctors to include this fruit in diets given to patients.

The carbohydrates in bananas aids in the body's protein storage and is highly digestable. Distress caused by eating them is due largely in eating unripe fruit. They should be eaten when entirely yellow flecked with brown spots and must be thoroughly chewed.

When buying bananas, choose a bunch that still has part of the stem or stalk attached to it, which contains a ripening enzyme. When green bananas are detached from the stem, the ripening process is incomplete. Have you ever had a banana that tasted flat or bland - well this is the reason?


PLAN VACATION CHURCH SCHOOL

Dr. Waters said that research indicated that childbirth defects and ill health could be attributed to fluoridation and assailed the US Public Health Service & American Dental Association for support of the program.

He drew applause when he contended that attempts are made to forcefluoridation on communities by city councils & other agencies rather than by a vote of citizens. He said that the Public Health Service had withheld grants from institutions whose researchers had reported it as not beneficial.

Dr. Waters charged that statistics are juggled and that adding fluoride to water may delay tooth decay but not prevent it. His statements were challenged by Dr. Vincent R. Bacino, a dentist from Fletcher Hills, who contended that he was wrong on all his information.

The first part of the program was devoted to a talk by Harry LaDou, executive chairman on the War against Litter, showed slides of scenic areas marred by trash. He said group action could help in removing eyesores.
