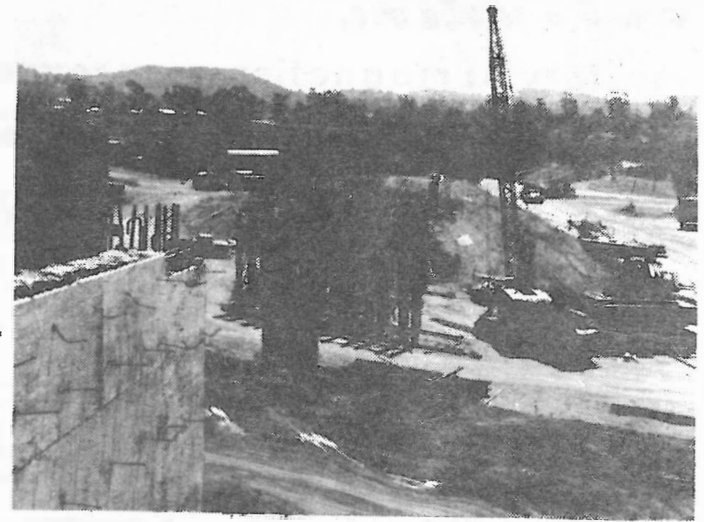

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# EDITORIAL

## Mystery of magnetism may reveal much!

Man's discovery of the atom and its fury, or power that can be used for good, may someday be eclipsed in rendering benefits to humanity, by plain everyday magnetism.

Recently in Boston, 1300 physical scientists from all over the planet studied magnetism at a week-long meeting. This force is one of the oldest known ones, yet is perhaps the

least understood of such phenomena, but may under their close scrutiny, reveal a lot.

Topics were magnetic vibrations, waves, tape memories as used in computers and our home recorders, and other points of interest. This was the largest meeting ever held on magnetism, still, like electricity, a vast unknown in nature's yet vaster wonderland.

Perchance a more intensive study of our daily life, habits, food and so on, may someday reveal how we can live without sickness and early death. Scientists have declared that the universe is a vast electro-magnetic organism, from distant suns down to the tiniest cells in our innards.

One outstanding point in this great conference of scientists, even from Russia and Europe, was this point, that most magnets, when heated, will reach a particular temperature at which their magnetism begins rapidly to disappear. At this point, the particles in the material seem to be in utter chaos.

Several natural nutritionists who advocate eating only raw food, as heat destroys enzymes, vitamins and unknown qualities, may thus be vindicated in their beliefs when the full knowledge of magnetism is understood and--used.

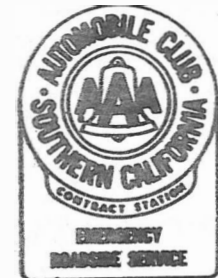

At center left is Peutz Valley Road coming into Hwy 80 where bridge piers are rising and huge culvert is being covered. Earth and rocks being blasted from mountain above are now being hauled down to fill canyon while route is slowly being cut to grade.

At lower right is Harbison Canyon Road, with shortcut to Peutz Valley Rd., which will later be straightened, widened, to give onto Hwy 80, to be named Alpine Blvd., when Interstate 8 is opened end of 1968.

Along top can be discerned Tavern Rd, and its crossing of freeway at left where interchange for Alpine is being built.

### DISCUSS AMBULANCE IDEA AGAIN

While a majority of citizens, invited by fire commissioners to be present at a discussion of a community ambulance service, voted to table the matter till more data can be had from county supervisors, it looks like Alpine might eventually get such a service.

A letter from county counsel was read explaining the possibilities and the liabilities.

Cost of operation, need for 2 or more operators on 24-hour call, necessary experience, and numerous other facets were discussed with the group. Some thought the service would be free, which is not the case. A private service estimated it would cost \$52,844, about double that of operating the fire district.

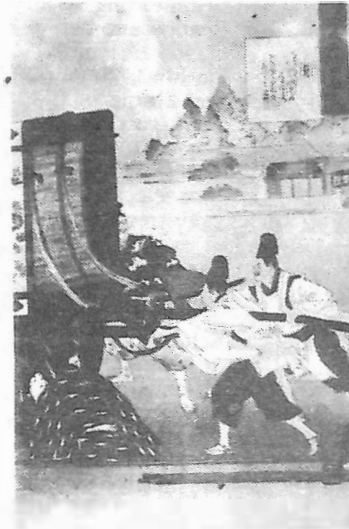

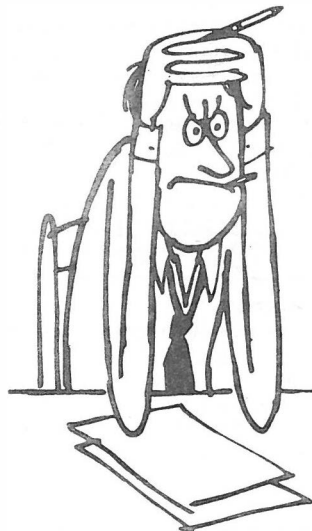
