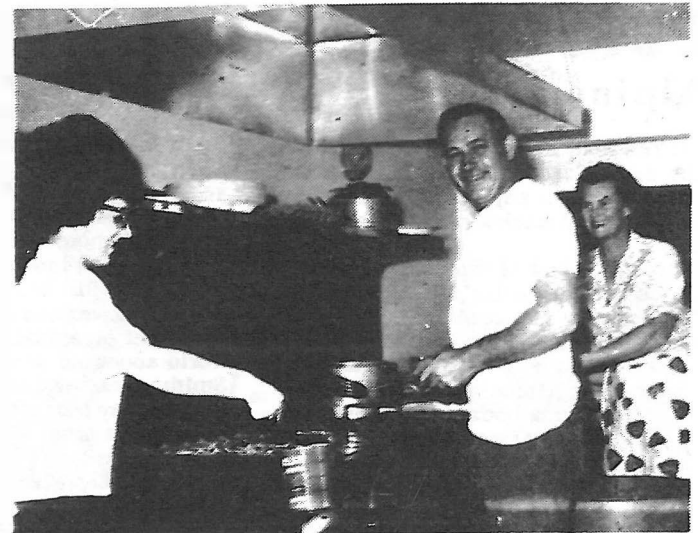

# EDITORIAL

## Alpine claim to best climate confirmed.

You read in the last issue about how the experts recently rated San Diego-- which includes adjacent areas such as Alpine-- as America's most healthful city.

It was a jury of top experts, as told in the current Ladies' Home Journal. The growing metropolis which is now only 29 minutes from here over the freeway-- may be a minute or two closer when Alpine's section of Interstate 8 is opened next year-- has much to offer, and was among 24 cities in the US listed. It made top place as "the most livable city".

We who live here and came here for climatic reasons, have no doubts about this. I first selected it in 1937 after traveling from Oregon to Mexico, and the coast to the deserts. Weathermen everywhere pinpointed this as the most equable all-year climate, which we believe it really is. It is known nationally as a haven for asthmatics and other bronchial sufferers, also arthritis, and even heart patients get relief here.

San Diego has much to offer besides superb climate: the great zoo, Sea World, Balboa Park, its proximity to old Mexico, countless parks, camp-

sites, lakes and beaches, and whale watching, which thousands see every year, the great Mother Goose Parade in EC, the Southern California Exposition and many more attractions.

We had an interesting chat on the phone with Bill Brotherton, director of the SD Convention & Visitors' Bureau, a booster organization that tells the world about our area. Back in 1961 Bob Smith, then head of the bureau, told us that they sent out 600,000 pieces of literature a year. Today it is over 900,000. Before they had 250 conventions, now it is 421, with 301,000 delegates coming from everywhere. At that time daily population of visitors was 68,000, but today it is 85,000. Then these people spent \$200 million a year, now it is \$270 million.

This bureau is the 2nd largest in the U. S. with 1171 members whereas in 1961 they had 650; now spends \$816,000 annually in advertising, as against \$300,000 before.

In 1961 the Naval Training Center was visited by 160,000, families of men in boot camp; today it is much larger. They all go places, do things, spend money.

Brotherton says that every year half of American families take a vacation, and 25% won't go over 500 miles from home. The bureau is making it more attractive for them to go farther, come here. Already SD is the major visitors' mecca of the world.

San Diego, and its wonderful hinterland, will reap more benefits from this influx of visitors every year, and Alpine will naturally share in some of this. That is why you should always send Alpine leaflets, copies of the Sun, and weather records when you write friends and relatives, telling them to come here! -CI.

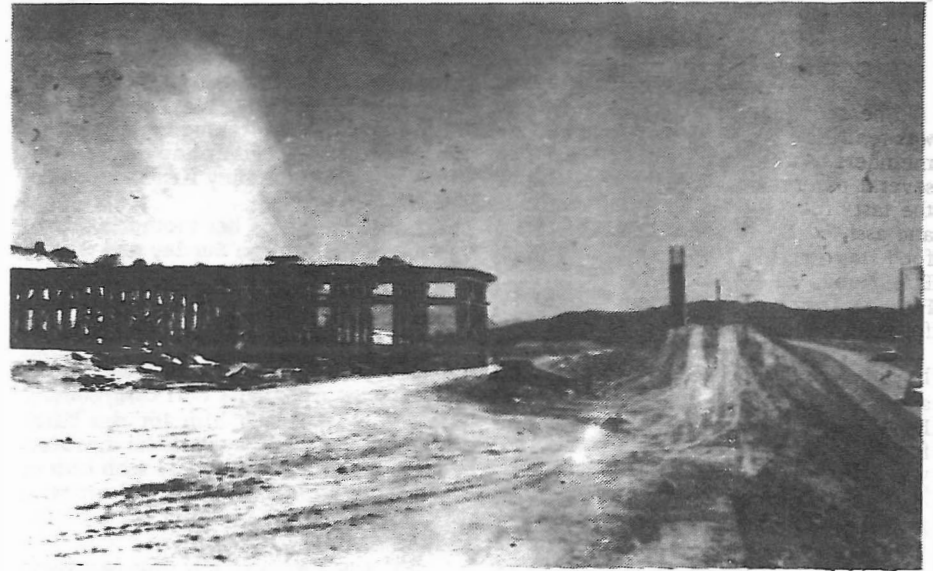

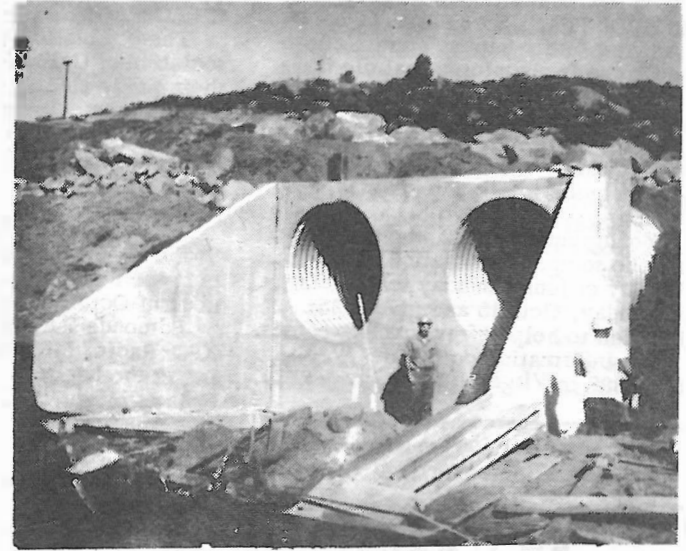

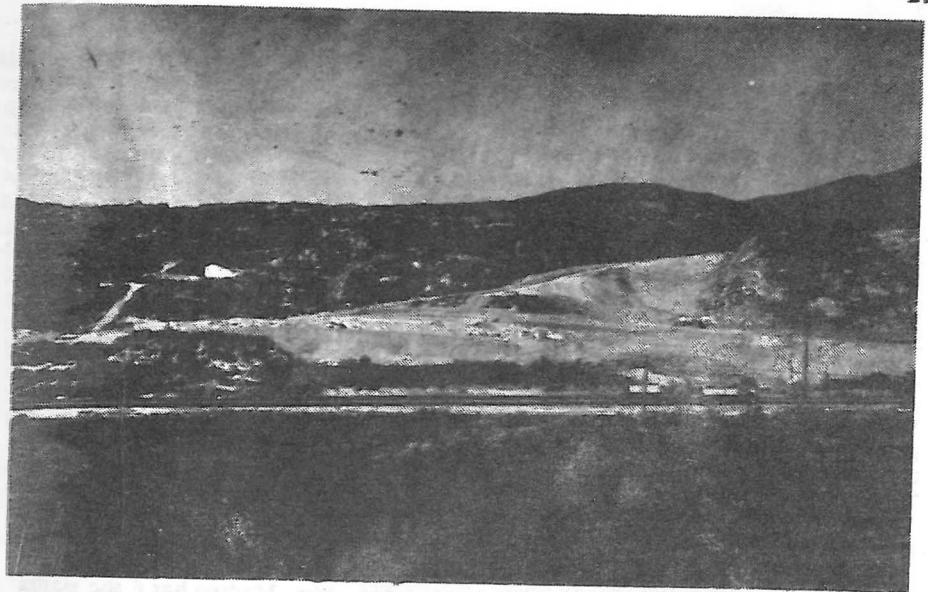

## CARE OF THE BODY

### IODINE, NATURAL FOOD FOR BRAIN

What is this important element iodine and what part does it play in our bodies?

The U. S Senate recently claimed that 60 millions did not get enough iodine in their daily food and that the deficiency was a foremost national health problem and one that should be speedily solved.

If iodine is so important for the system and appears in many vegetables and fruits, why is there a deficiency? This can be answered quite simply. The first all-important reason is that the food of civilized man in no way resembles food in its natural state. Usually is ground, sifted, boiled, pasteurized, sterilized and even colored so that most of the vitamins and minerals have been destroyed. The public is beginning to realize most diets lack the necessary elements for proper nu -

trition, but do nothing to improve conditions. Unfortunately, the amount of iodine left in our present devitalized foods barely supports brain growth. Some of this is due to the soil which does not have enough iodine and other essential minerals to give the plants.

Therefore, when an iodine deficiency occurred in the daily menus other sources had to be found, and as the soil received the iodine at the time the land was still covered by water, the source for it was the sea, or in kelp. Marine algae has the power of absorbing iodine from the ocean and stores it in the plant tissues. Kelp contains a large percentage of iodine as well as other important elements required by the body.

An addition of kelp to one's daily diet will lead to a marked stimulation of the brain and nervous system and the more the brain is used the more supply of food iodine is required. Just how intelligent you are does not necessarily mean you have always had the amount of iodine to keep your brain active. But when there is a lack, the brain does not develop normally and it cannot work as it should.

Down to the sea for food instead of in ships may well be the motto for the coming generation unless more foods containing iodine are consumed.

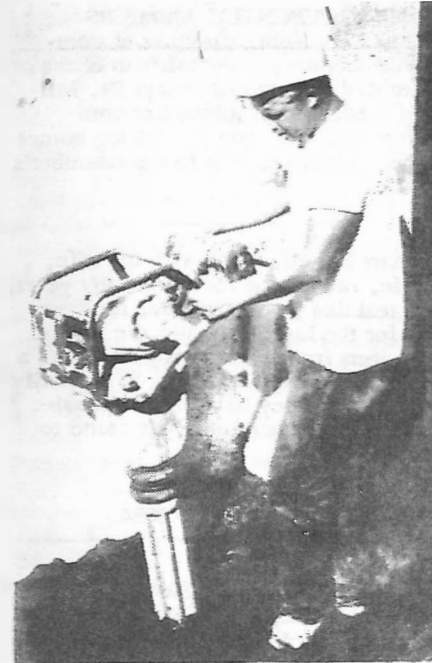
