

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

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

That hour's difference throws you off in your psychological habits of life and it takes several days to get back to normal.





This is entrance of 15' culvert now being finished on south side of Hwy 80 that will carry Alpine Creek stormwaters through, under freeway and cut into Peutz Valley and down to El Capitan Resrvoir.

Old concrete tunnel built in 1933, which just went under Hwy 80, is being broken up, will be sealed with concrete when fan-shaped entry is poured at sides of big steel cyliner.

Workers are breaking up parts of entrance not blasted when it was wrecked to make way for new one.

Frank Carmelo of EC operated the big dozer that wrecked out the concrete after it was dynamited. He is a pilot, too, flies out of Gillespie Field, had to build a road in to work on the tunnel.

"It was fine" he says, "only I got a nasty case of poison oak as that creekbed is full of the stuff".

Gus Jepson, engineer for Daley Co., had to do some fine figuring to get within one foot of the headwall where the water enters. They had to leave both tunnels open as a sudden flashflood could have done a lot of damage.



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


Little John Armbruster, 6, and our new neighbor, has to be in the hospital during Thanksgiving vacation to get his tonsils out.






