VOTERS TURN DOWN HOSPITAL

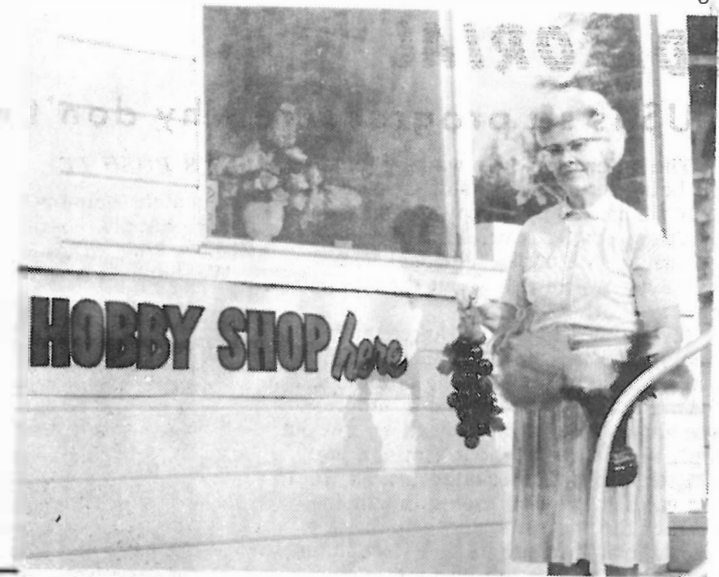

A watch company executive has predicted that the United States will be on 24-hour time within the next five years. We hope he's right.





The U.S. is on the 12 hour system, a.m. and p.m., while most of the world has long been on the 24 hour system, 1200 hours noontime and 2400 at midnight. U.S. Military and American international carriers are also on the 24-hour system.

Eliminating the obsolete a.m. and p.m. system would be a great boon to all transportation companies, especially domestic airlines. Shortly after World War II the management of Western Air Lines turned to the 24-hour clock in hopes of winning converts among other carriers. The move failed, unfortunately. It would be helpful if the airlines themselves took some initiative in using dual-faced clocks as a first move toward complete conversion.

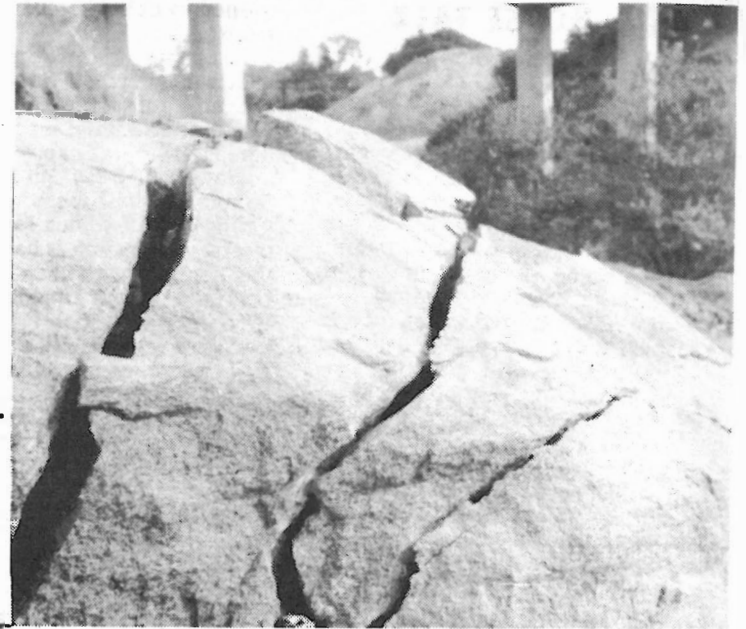

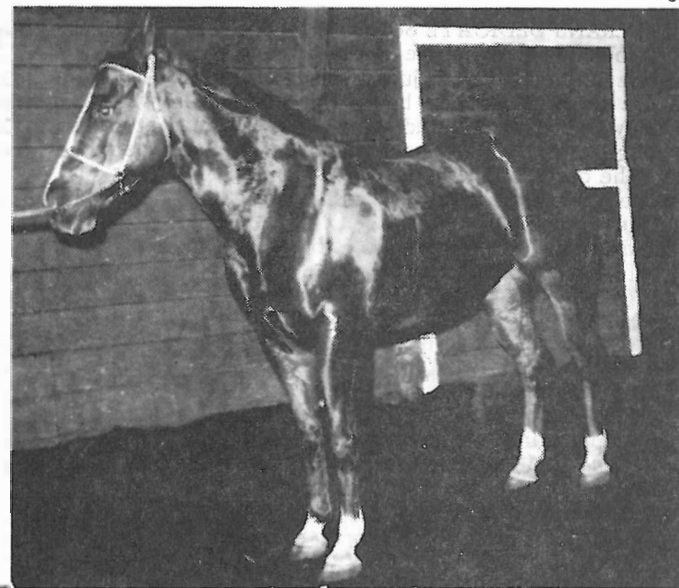

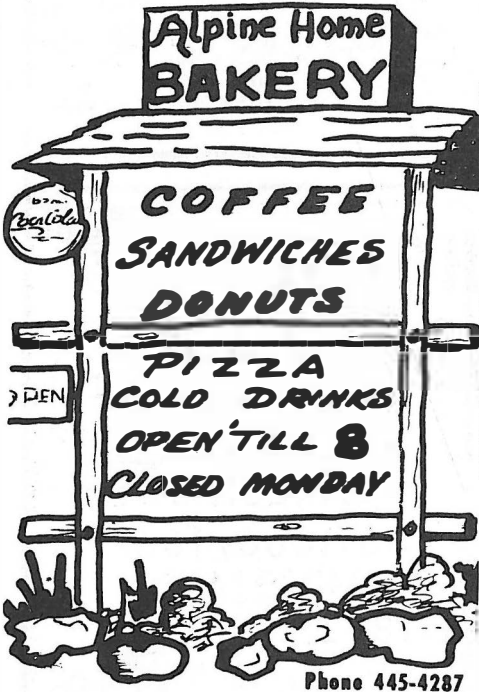
LUTHERANS DEDICATE SUNDAY

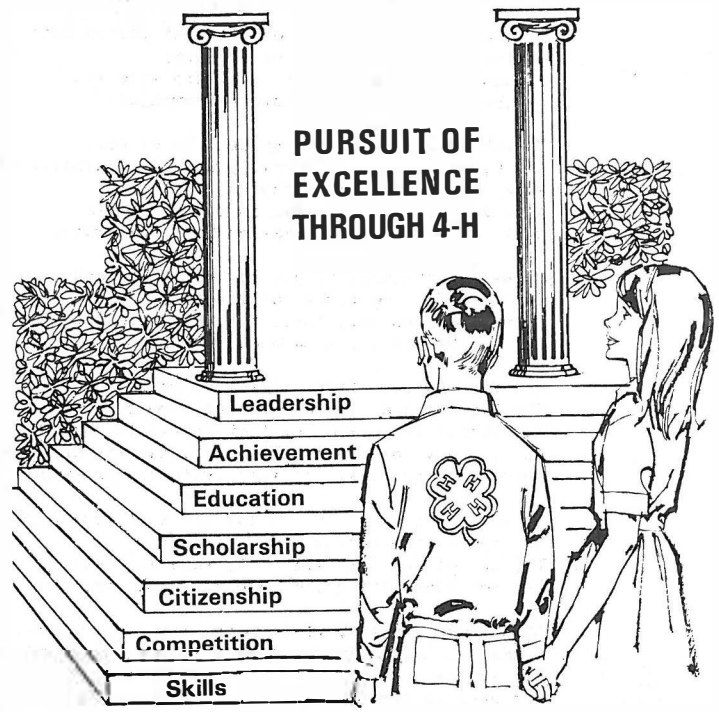
Permits have been secured and building will start any day on this fine edifice.

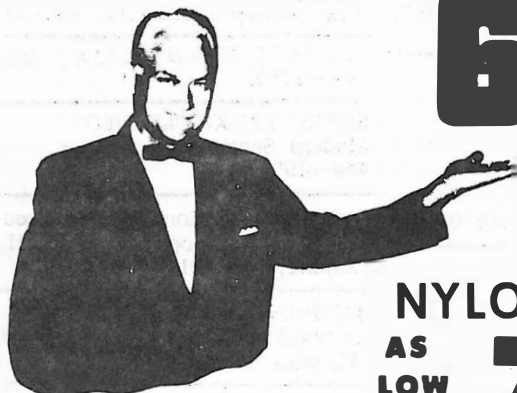
