the smallest Star Route carrier, and the little one-desk postoffice in some hamlet, are always working to "get the mail through", for us all.

Everyone can help the busy service by mailing right now, and be sure to check your address for unsealed greetings as the 4¢ stamp will not guarantee forwarding or return of undeliverables.

Thus the addressee would not get it and your card and postage would be lost. You may send the unsealed card with no writing but your name inside, for 4¢. And use zip code also on your return address.

And lastly be sure your packets are securely wrapped, tied and properly addressed, and if extra valuable, register same. Be sure all matter is correctly stamped. Your carrier has a supply aboard. And one more thing, if sending more than just a few cards, use the red labels: "All for local", or all for out of town", and tie them in bundles.

Yes, indeed, happy holidays to our growing Alpine postoffice. - CI.

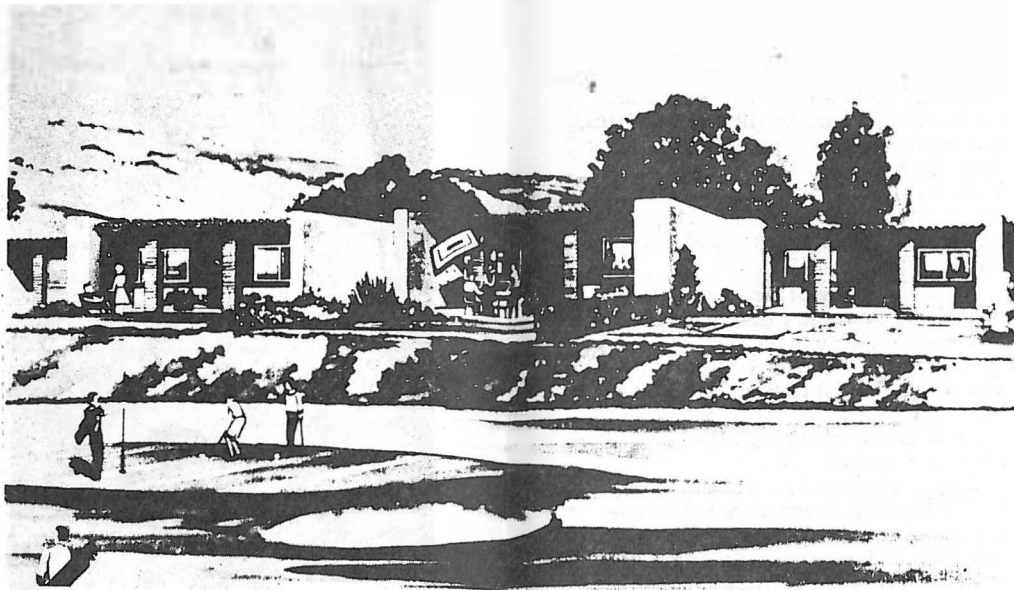

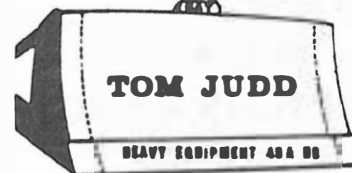

CARE OF THE BODY

ALCOHOL AND THE BODY cont.

In addition to lowering one's resistance to infection, alcohol attacks all organs of the body, chiefly the stomach and liver. Medical authorities have listed the following symptoms:

The stomach becomes inflamed and there is indigestion, lack of appetite, nausea and thirst. Inflammation of the throat and mouth is almost always present.

The liver changes in character, becomes enlarged, congested and undergoes fatty degeneration. The filtering process goes haywire.

The heart weakens, blood oxidation is interfered with and blood vessels degenerate.

The bowels become irregular and inflamed. Constipation results.

The nerves are irritated, causing brain cells to retract making the mind sluggish.

Too much alcohol produces low blood sugar. (We'll print an article on this in the future.)

Dr. E. M. Abrahamson M.D. has a diet for correcting or preventing low blood sugar. He suggests using lots of vegetables and fruits (canned fruits should be packed in water, not syrup. Lettuce, mushrooms and nuts used as freely as desired. Juice: Any unsweetened fruit or vegetable juice except grape or prune. Meat, fish, or poultry are O.K. Use very little bread. Avoid absolutely: sugar, candy and other sweets, sweet puddings, custards and ice cream, coffee, strong brewed tea and beverages containing caffeine. Potatoes, white rice, spaghetti, macaroni or noodles. Wines, cocktails and beer.

As a person drinks more, he eats less and less thereby robbing his body of the necessary protein, vitamins and minerals he needs. IS IT WORTH IT?

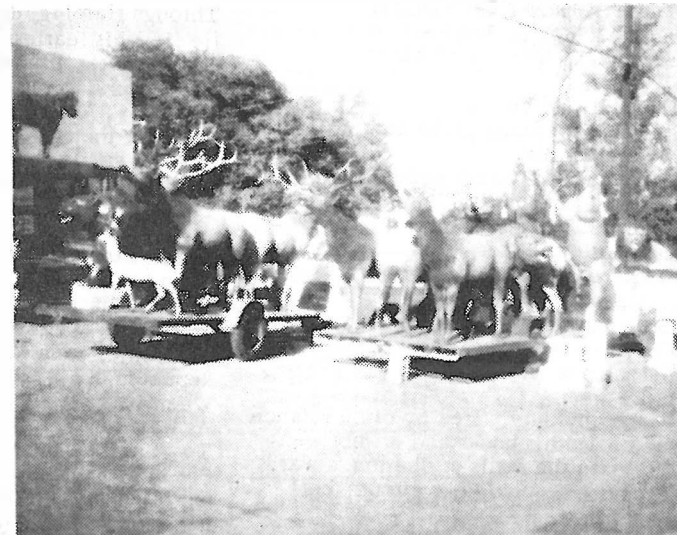
