START FINE NEW DWELLING



Some years ago we predicted that Alpine would someday be like Northridge, in upper San Fernando Valley where Hollywood greats and a lot of wealthy folks live and enjoy horses.

Alpine is fast assuming that type of a community for it has two of the county's 40 riding clubs, the Alpine Riding Club and the Pequeno Riders, for youngsters. Memberships go from 25 up to 250 and over. Each weekend there are several horseshows with good attendance from the horsev set.

Many fine breeds are raised in this climatically suitable spot, including the famous Arabian Horse Ranch of Harry Harness on Hawley Road, just below Dunbar Interchange. Till the passing of E. L. Freeland, Alpine had a noted stable where appaloosas were raised and entered in nationally famous shows, winning prizes galore.

fry and their elders. Realty folks say many today are looking for land and homes in this lovely community.

George Carrell who runs a busy feed store here says the horse population is increasing and that business in the back country is going ahead steadily. He and his wife are expert riders, too.

Our county is the home of the world's largest horseshow at the fair in Del Mar. We also have the National Pinto Association, and other organizations having to do with horse breeding. It is said that the horse population is now 25 times greater than when the animal was used in transportation.

Way back in 1920 they started the Coronado Horseshow with society's topflights present, coming to compete in the many events. Today they plan a training place for horses, and a jockey school for the racing field. An English riding school is said to be on the drawing board, and other facilities to feature horses and shows.

There are some 40 feed stores. trophy firms -- Norbob Trophy Co., being in Alpine--western outfitters-also one here. Alpine Western Wear-plus veterinarian hospitals, doctors and suppliers. Carl's Leather & Boots in EC. handles many items and serves the whole back country. Another phase which runs into real money is the trailer business, many fine custom trailers being built in this area.

What Alpine should do now is to make a big project of riding trails in and around the community to link up with the famous California Riding and Hiking Trail which goes right through here. Let's saddle up! - CI



CLIMATE OF ALPINE. CALIFORNIA

STATION HISTORY

The first Weather Bureau records for Alpine were taken between February 1, 1935, and August 31, 1945, by Harold L. Flegal, at his vineyard about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile southwest of the postoffice. The elevation was given as 1900. The instruments for this station were furnished by the Chamber of Commerce. The more recent data used in this summary were obtained from a point mile west of the post-office at an elevation of 1700. The records at this location were started on October 2, 1952, by Ernest W. Wright and were continued to December 1958. Here the shelter was still the property of the Chamber of Commerce, but the thermometers and rain gage were furnished by the Weather Bureau.

Beginning in December 1958 the station has been operated by the Fire Department, with Robert Fey as the observer. The location is a mile west of the postoffice at an elevation of 1735 feet.

There are also records

available from two other locations in the area. From May 1951 to Oct. 1952 observers were H.E. Aston and Marion C. Aston. Their station was about 1.2 miles north northeast of the postoffice, at 2260 feet. R.E. Gastil took observations from January 1950 to May 1951, but we have no information concerning the location and exposure of this station. Because of the higher elevation of the Aston station and doubt about the location of Gastil's we have not included these records in this summary. The wisdom of combining the Flegal and Wright records might be debated, but it has been done in order to provide a long enough record to make a useful summary.

Most of the Alnine records

Most of the Alpine records have been published currently in the California section of the Weather Bureau's Climatological Data. The original manuscript copies, for the most part, are on file in the Weather Bureau Office in

San Francisco.

during the summer would drop into the 30's most after-noons and rise to the 60's at night. Winter readings are somewhat higher. Occasionally very dry conditions are reported when east and northeast winds prevail over southern California. These situations may develop at any time, dropping humidities to 10% or lower, but they are most likely during the late fall or early winter months.

The prevailing wind direction is from the southwest, northwest and west winks are also quite common. While the average speed is probably quite light there may be occasional strong winds associated with thunderstorms or with the more widespread storms of winter. Also, the infrequent east winds may

at times reach great enough speeds to cause slight local

damage.
The last 32° temperature of the spring occurs early in April, on the average, while the first freezing temperature in the fall can be expected near the end of November, giving the average length of the growing season of about 235 days.

CARE OF THE BODY

By Frances McTaggart

EAT LESS. LIVE LONGER

For some time it has been known that the less one eats the longer he tends to live.

In fact during World War 1 the Carnegie Institute conducted a typical experiment that proved much along these lines. A group of healthy young men a number being athletes, were kept for months on a diet of spare proportions that reduced them to 10% below the weight which they had maintained on an ordinary full diet, though none had ever been really fat.

They were, therefore, brought into about the same physical condition as the spare and wirey elderly men of the type who live the longest. To do this required a reduction of about a third of their accustomed amount of food. On this more meager diet there was no evidence of loss of physical power.

Many elaborate studies and measurements were made without showing any marked physical changes, with one exception. This was that in every case there was a marked decrease in pulse, accompanied by a drop in bloodpressure. In short, the most invariable and the most striking effect of a spare diet is that of decreasing the work of the heart and the circulatory system. Obviously this decrease, together with the lessened amount of waste to be excreted from the blood, also puts less work on the kidneys, those important organs of elimination which break down so early in many lives.

The moral to be drawn from the above, is that man should eat less, and less, to conserve energy-- and


