

In this issue you will note a story about Mrs. John Bilsky's son-in-law, Cdr. Wm. H. Jones, USN, at Navy Hospital in St. Albans, NY. When she showed us the story and photo in the Banner, its house organ, we found a real heartwarming story.

A group of businessmen 20 years ago contributed \$52 yearly toward a fund to entertain disabled war veterans. Their 52 Association Center, among picturesque surroundings in Ossining, N. Y., is today in its 9th season with extensive recreational facilities most suitable for handicapped personnel. It has 42 lovely acres with a recreational hall and games, a $4\frac{1}{2}$ acre lake for swimming, fishing and boating, an archery range, family BBQ facilities, built right into the water for easiest use of paraplegics and amputees, and a baseball field.

The membership Committee of the C of C, wishes to thank the residents of Highlands and Palo Verde for their cordial welcome during the Committee's door to door campaign for new members.







ting the year's job off the ground with the Vinnell Co., of Phoenix. Kocher and his family live in EC.

"This project is mostly earth moving" Kocher told the Sun Monday when he took Editor Irvine to the east end of the job where big bulldozers are eating away at the 80-foot cut, as shown in photo looking east on page 10.

This 3.7 mile stretch from the Willows Interchange to Deadman's Curve, will cost \$3,400,000 and should be completed in Jan. 1969. The Alpine project-- from present end of the freeway to the Willows-- by the Daley firm, should open this December, or






