CHAMBER HEARS OF ASPHALT PLANT

Wednesday's session of the chamber of commerce was aroused over the status of the Daley hot mix plant which has been approved by county planning. It got the green light because no protests were made to letters notifying 17 nearby property-owners, only 6 local ones, and one deceased! No advertising locally was done.

Dr. E.C. Woodall told of the dangers of air pollution, and how the permit for a year was had for the 300-ton an hour plant which crushes rock, mixes with hot oil emitting 40 lbs of contaminants an hour.

Petitions are being signed against it, but supervisors say they are powerless to act. Now they will try to prevent renewal of the permit which is to expire on Jan. 11, or March 31, 1969. Notices were sent out on Dec. 29-- during the holidays-- with but 10 days for protest!

EDITORIAL

ARTHUR GODFREY EULOGIZES DUKE KAHANAMOKU.

On a recent Monday after the death of my old friend Duke Kahanamoku, famous Olympic swimmer, I was driving to Lindbergh Field, as usual tuned in Arthur Godfrey on KFMB. I like his show for he is not only a funster, musician and a good banjo player, but he is really a poet and a famous pilot, often telling about a recent flight and the beauties we see up in the wondrous heavens.

He was running a tape made in Honolulu at the funeral of Duke, with whom I had worked in a picture at Warner Brothers as technical advisor on the South Seas. Duke played many chiefs in the films, and was a pretty good actor, and a wonderful fellow. In this picture were other old friends, Myrna Loy and Noah Beery.

Godfrey was a pallbearer for Duke, and his description with taped excerpts from the Episcopalian ceremony and the sublime Masonic words, made me have tears in my eyes all the way from El Cajon to the airport.

Duke was an inspiration to all young people with ambitions toward prowess in the water, physical fitness and the clean life. He was a sprint swimmer in the Olympics, 1912-1928. He kept his fine physique-- 6ft 1", 200 pounds-- and his shock of long, iron-gray hair, in later years became world famous as

the sheriff, later as greeter.

Godfrey, in fine voice, told of the beachboy funeral Duke had wanted, in detail, his ashes, urn and all, being gently lowered into the lovely sea off Waikiki, beyond the reef, where we had surfed and canoed in bygone years, when I covered the waterfront on the Honolulu Advertiser, lived at the old Waikiki Tavern, and swam for hours.

When Godfrey played the finale of the funeral and the ever-emotional Aloha Oe was sung by the Hawaiians I love so well, it simply broke me up, like the song has done many a time when I was on the pier for the Advertiser seeing a ship glide slowly away, and that piece was played by the band.

Thanks, Arthur, for a beautiful and touching tribute to our mutual friend, Duke Kahanamoku, whose death marks the passing of an era in our beloved Islands.

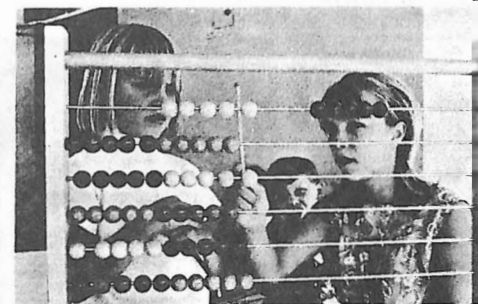

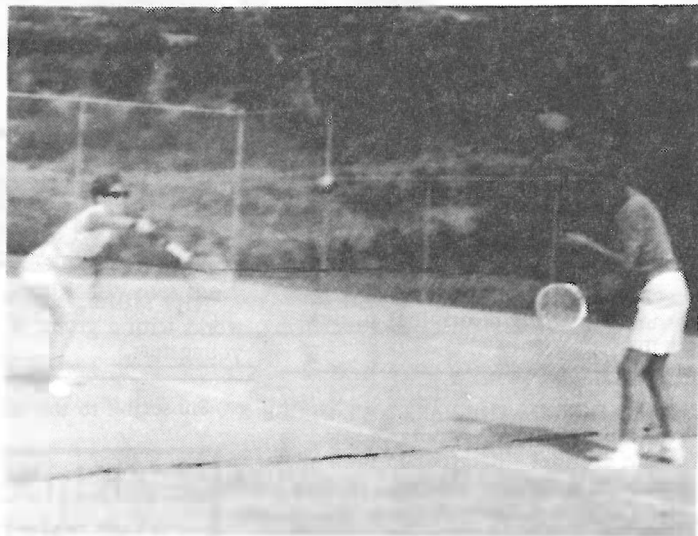

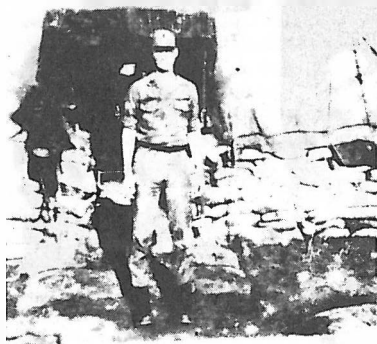
