EDITORIAL

SUPPORT OF FREE PRESS INSURES YOUR FREEDOM

The other day on Radio 860, we heard that talented commentator Melvin Munn with his thought-provoking Life Line out of Dallas, talking about "Free Press vs. Controlled Press", which was quite enlightening.

It made us realize that the people in America have supported this guaranteed free speech and free press which our constitution gives us, and today we should support the press more strongly than ever.

Munn, whose fine voice and diction should be heard by everyone, including students, said "The profession of journalism in this country has a history of fierce independence. American journalism has long considered its primary objective to be the discovery and the printing or speaking of truth. The classic American journalist is one who is inquisitive, in-



corruptible, fearless, and dedicated to the highest principles of free speech".

As you well know, the first newspapers were "Advertisers", with little news, and people always read them to learn of buys and what was happening. Today it is quite similar, only we have papers with all the news, features and photos, plus the supporting advertisers.

It is strange that a businessman can honestly say that advertising in the paper does not pay, because it does. The Sun, for example, is a sort of copilot of the chamber of commerce. In Alpine the chamber does not hold office hours all day, or all week so people call the Sun for information and so on. We mail out scores of papers to folks who hear of Alpine and want information. When a new family thus moves in, the businessman does receive a benefit from his ad, for his money keeps the paper in operation, and helps in its little way to retain our freedoms.

This newspaper has espoused several major projects here, and hopes to do more. As Munn says "Americans have grown to maturity and lived out their lives under a personal assurance that whatever is good, whatever is bad, whatever is right, and whatever is wrong with this nation and its people will show up in the press. So long as this condition exists, the chance that alien philosophies and infiltrators will be able to conquer and control our people is greatly diminished."

The Sun is a little grassroots newspaper, but it takes pride in being in the great fraternity that carries this burden of protection for our beautiful country.

So when we ask you about your ad for next week's issue, just remember that this is your community newspaper which you should support. - CI.

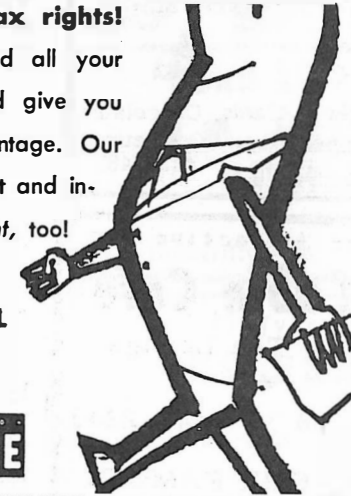

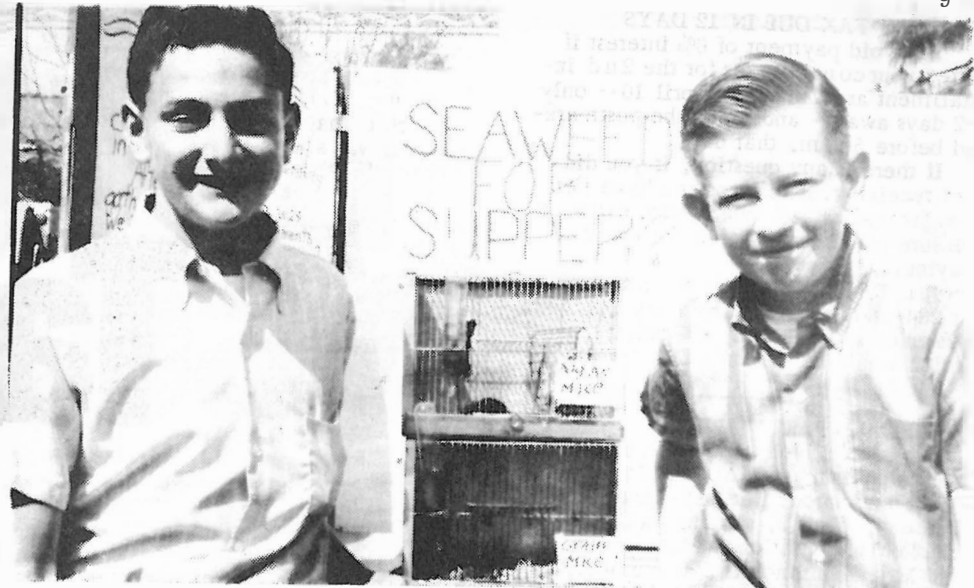

LOCAL LADS WIN SCIENCE FAIR

While many folks today eat seaweed in tablet form for good nutritional balance, many do not realize how this type of food will add zest, energy and endurance to life.

So two boys, Chris Manion, at left, and Randy Hine, both 13, and in the 8th grade at Alpine School, built an interesting exhibit for the science fair just finished here. They call it "Seaweed for Supper", a project that shows algae vs. grain, in mouse feeding.

"We made 3 tests", explains Chris, "one being the rpm record of both groups in a cage wheel in which the algae-fed ones did 71, with an average of 60, while the grain-feds did only 44, with an average of 37".

"Another test was for preference", Randy said "they ate the algae all right, but they preferred grains, which they of course had eaten for ages".

If there is any question, if you did not receive your bill, or you have just bought real estate, check with escrow to be sure you are not liable for this 2nd payment.

Jas. E. Jones, county tax collector, at 234-8813, will clear up any questions. Better be safe than pay 6% penalty, which would be \$60 on a \$1,000 tax bill.

JUNIOR VOLUNTEER FIREMEN BUSY

Alpine Fire Protection District is getting out its annual notice and burning regulations to residents of the district, the commission reports. Junior firemen are folding, stapling and mailing them. There are now 9 juniors on the roster and they are being trained under supervision of the regular volunteers.

One important point in the notice is that the district "is authorized to clear or order cleared any land having flammable material which endangers the public safety by creating a fire hazard, or nuisance".

Of course property-owners would receive notice, allowing them to object within 30 days. The board may have it done and assess actual costs to the landowner.

Another important matter: be sure you are in the district, which your tax bill will reveal. This governs fire insurance rates, also. And it lets you know you are entitled to protection in case of fire.

Burning regulations will not be repeated here as each householder in this district will receive one, but the commission advises careful perusal of the notice and regulations-- for your own benefit.

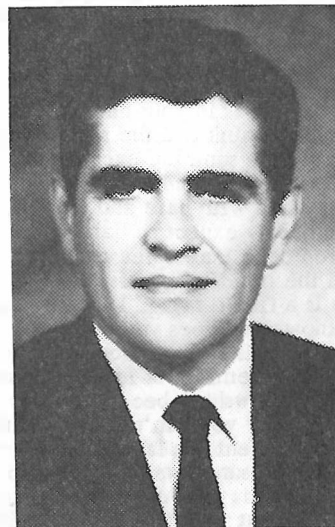

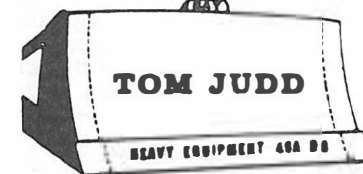
