The downtown hullabaloo over those red "No parking at any time signs", on Hwy 80 east and west of S. Marshall Road, has been remedied. Supervisors compromised by accepting a new noparking plan illustrated by County Engineer David Speer.

GROFE, FAMED COMPOSER, RAPS MODERN MUSIC.

Everyone loves Ferd Grofe's "Grand Canyon Suite", one part of which is most colorful "On the Trail", is heard often on radio.

Back in 1909 when I went to St. Vincent's College, young Grofe was also a student there. He later went to Europe, studied, became famous for his beautiful compositions.

The old school turned out many brilliant students between 1865 and 1911 when it closed, its charter going to Loyola, near LA. Down through the years we have enjoyed reunions.

Last June I had the great pleasure of seeing Grofe, who was guest of honor. Although he was in a wheelchair, having suffered a stroke, he was jovial and inspiring.

I gave him a copy of the Sun. He

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later subscribed, and I hear from his wife, who writes for him. Perhaps you, too, love his many compositions.

To get to the point, Grofe was once interviewed by Frank Rhoades in the SD Union, who quoted him: "That is why so many old songs are being revived", referring to the cacophony that is today being termed music. "People love melody and melody is being sacrificed for (instrumental) effects", he said.

Ferd thought melody started going before WW2, which did not produce one song that will live, like "Over There", and others, saying it might be due to the modern age.

Until around 1940 we listened all the time to radios, but today we turn it off more often, when those moaning groaning, yapping, yelling male and female "singers", come on.

We used to dance to Lawrence Welk's smooth music at Ocean Park before he became famous. Once I said "Lawrence, if you keep playing that sweet music, you'll be a big name band". He says he does not play any music he cannot understand.

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

OK ROAD WORK FOR 1968-69

Ed Hughes in charge of the county road station here whose crews maintain all thoroughfares in the area that belong to the county, reports that 7 of his items were included in the new budget of \$10.8 million. Over \$1.5 million will go for roads in the back country incuding EC and others,

Hughes says the total for this area shows \$22, 843. The largest is \$7,058. for Alpine Heights Rd. to restore the roadway for 1.34 miles west from South Grade Rd. Next is widening of 3 feet each side Hidden Glen Rd. (Japatul area), for traffic of . 96 mile, north half for \$4, 185. Then \$3, 874 goes for restoring roadway on Willows Rd. for .41 mile, with \$3,634 for same on Harbison Canyon Rd. for . 69 mile northeast from Patrick Dr. Then below there, Dehesa Rd. will be restored for .3 mile east from HC Rd. for \$2, 125. Similar work will be done on Foss Rd. for \$1,360. south of Arnold Way for .31 mile. Finally, Eltinge Dr., south of Hwy 80 will be restored for . 08 mile at a cost of \$607.

Note- Eltinge ends at South Marshall, which is a short street going from Hwy 80 up over the hill. Where it ends, one road leads off to the west, another south into Shadyrock Ranch and entries to a couple of houses. North Marshall goes from Hwy 80, Bob Wilson's Texaco corner, but for some reason is not mark-

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
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MISS ALPINE'S BIG NIGHT DUE

The next time you purchase a bag of dried fruit or a sack of candy, take a careful look at the label. Chances are both will contain glucose, a very dangerous form of sugar which has been definitely found to produce diabetes in test animals.

Because it is the cheapest form of sugar, glucose is used widely as a filler or adulterant in foods.

Because they are assimilated slower than sugars and do not overload the pancreatic function of supplying insulin, starches are better energy foods than sugars. Glucose is the quickets of all sugars to diffuse through the intestinal wall. It is the quickest to pass through the tissues and arrive at the muscle cell where it is converted into energy. Yet, this diffusibility is the prime reason it is the least desirable sugar.

Since glucose gets into the blood stream so quickly after we eat, the body must produce a great amount of insulin to compensate for the shock

dose of glucose.

Soft drinks are harmful because most of them contain large amounts of glucose so our appetite no longer demands the wholesome foods we should eat. The diets of far too many lack sufficient amounts of calcium. This is due to the fact that we fill up on various refined sugar products. The body usually does not get the essential vitamins and minerals which it needs when this is the case.

Make it a point to check carefully the labels on all food you purchase. A void those which contain adulterants-and especially those with glucose. The small a mount of time you'll spend learning food contents will be more than compensated in your family's good health.



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
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
