But a white man has compounded the sins of the white man against the Negro Race, and it will take years for it to be righted. But our one hope is that the death of this great and good man will help to bring both White and Black to their senses and to appreciate the great laws of the universe and try to emanate love and friendship;

We hope this sad event will awaken the younger Negro pouplation to the error of their ways of violence, burning, looting. Love will accomplish more.

As Adm. Leslie Gehres, SD Republican County Central Committee chairman stated: "The assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King has removed from American life a great and dedicated leader in the cause of social justice and has silenced a desperately needed voice of moderation in a time of turmoil and violence. Just as the rifle fired at President John F. Kennedy was aimed at every citizen so was the rifle fired at Dr. Martin Luther King aimed at all citizens of good will. In life he awakened the conscience of the nation. His violent death will stir the nation to make real his dream of liberty and justice for all. We pledge ourselves to do all within our power to advance the cause of equality for which Dr. King died."


SCOUTS SELL TICKETS TO FAIR




CHURCH READY BY JUNE 1

An overnight hike is being planned by Scouts for April 21 when they hike from the Descanso Ranger station to Alpine.



CHAMBER HOSTS CONTEST JUDGES


