EDITORIAL

QUALITIES OF YOUNG PEOPLE ARE COMMENDED.

For every youngster that lands in juvenile hall, there are many hundreds, maybe thousands, that belong to a majority group of fine, upstanding young people that never make the news.

This was called to our attention by Mrs. Nellie King, former Oregonian, who presented an April issue of the Oregon Grange Bulletin, pointing to an editorial by the state master of that fine organization that has done so much to further high living conditions in America. He is Allen P. Wheeler, and we quote from his Comments.

He discusses briefly "the qualities of our young people, which are the opposite of what we ordinarily read in the papers. How unfortunate that the picture portrayed through the press would lead us to a belief that all young peo-



ple have somehow "missed the boat'."

He tells of attending an FFA convention and enjoying the session of a fine bunch of high school boys, in the show and out on the streets, all acting like gentlemen, give evidence of a deep feeling of self-respect.

At the opening the president asks "Future Farmers, why are we here?" Then comes the answer in unison, I believe as follows: "To practice brotherhood, honor rural opportunities and responsibilities, and develop these qualities of leadership which a Future Farmer should possess.

He mentions a Grange meeting which entertained Boy Scouts, who, after dinner, entertained with a program demonstrating some of their fine work.

"It was gratifying" he wrote "to have the leader discuss the high principles and to actually put a real challenge to the boys (and likewise to all present), to strive to live up to the ideals, as set forth in their Oath: to do their duty to God and to country, to help other people at all times, and finally: "To keep myself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight."

Finally he relates an enjoyable evening at another Grange session where 46 lovely young ladies sang, by memory, several songs, then took their seats in the audience and enjoyed the rest of the evening.

"Let us do our part" he concluded "to bring to them some measure of recognition for the good things they are constantly doing".

These are the ideals that keep up our faith in America and the rural areas. Being an Oregonian myself, I feel a nostalgic tug at my heart, for my father, pioneer newsman of Salem, where I was born, was one of the founders of the Oregon Agricultural Society, and taught us to love all nature, the woods, the rolling Oregon, and that ever beautiful Willamette River.

According to producers, more than 192 top cowboys will be on hand to compete for the prize money in excess of \$16,000. Scheduled to compete for the 1968 World Championship Title are Larry Mahan, 67 All-Around Cowboy, and Iowa's Paul Mayo. Mahan was the Rodeo Cowboy Association's top money-maker for a single season, pocketing \$11,996 last season.

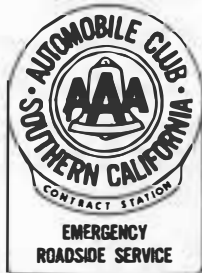

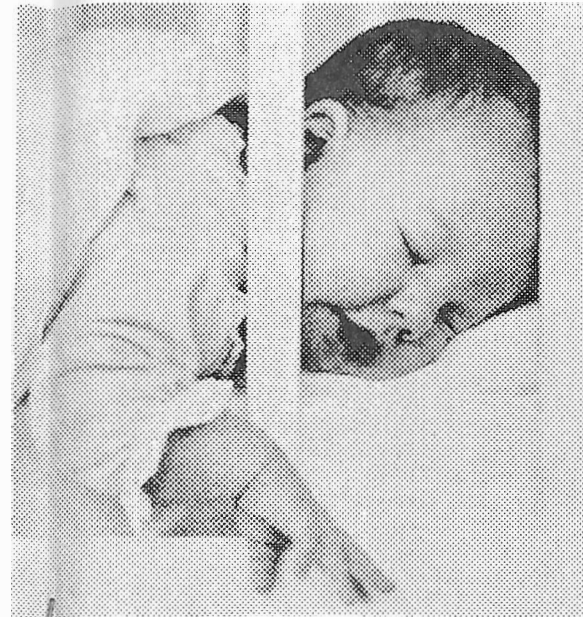

Intermittently about 80 gpm of spring water goes out of this pipe when the float rises on the other side of detour starting the big pump on W. National Library week started Sunday, ends tomorrow and their motto: "Reading is What's Happening".

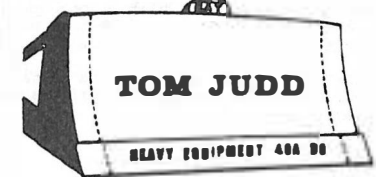

officials concurred in the project.

"The procedure is to get the option on suitable land" says Postmaster H. T. Magnussen, "then they advertise for bids, and after the building is ready, the department leases it back for a long term. They have a projection for the new building that runs for 20 years".

He explains that present quarters are already crowded, with no room for expansion for parking and so on. Today the office serves 535 PO boxes--there are no vacancies and no room for boxes--535 on the route, and about 50 in general delivery, a total of 1120 patrons. At 4 per box this would give Alpine a population of 4480.

"With the coming of the freeway by 1969 many new homes building now, and the new Vista Alpine Mobilhome Estates at 143 spaces, it is easy to see that we will need larger facilities immediately" adds Magnussen. "By Christmas, and when we get more boxes, we will be forced to split the route in two and add another carrier." Present PO has only 1164' now and is overcrowded.

FORT TO BE NAMED AFTER EDWARDS
In the small mining town of old Tombstone, Ariz., a new organization, a cavalry regiment has just been formed,



John Edwards, former Alpiner, disclosed to the Sun in an airmail letter Monday.

It is the Arizona Rifles, 6th Volunteer Cavalry, and the first troop has been called E Troop, in honor of John Edwards, son of the disabled WW2 veteran, now living in the picturesque desert town.

John Edwards gave his life for his country in Vietnam, as told in the Sun last Oct. 20. He was Alpine's first casualty. This new regiment also plans to build an old-style cavalry fort made of adobe bricks, and will be named Ft. John Edwards, to honor his memory.

Edwards, who enjoys better health at the 5000-foot altitude, is an officer and active member as is Uncle Ed Schuboth, who is mess officer for the regiment.

"Main purpose of this organization" says John, "is to give the young people here recreation, horseback riding, camping, dancing, picnics, marching in

parades and inspiration to be good American Citizens".

The unit is commanded by Col Robt. S. Lee, and Col. Cora Jane Lee is commanding officer of the Ladies' Auxiliary, from Cheyenne, Wyo. with Everett L. Brownsey as Provost Marshal. They have 80 members already, plus the auxiliary, and it is growing.

The Colonel's son Leroy, 7, is bugler for the outfit and Edwards gave Johnny's old Civil War Army bugle to him to play. Also John's dog Mike is now mascot for the outfit.

Tombstone's annual Helderorado Days, John says, will be Oct. 18-20, when the regiment will parade, with the youngsters in their uniforms.

LTC J. M. Farrell, USA, has sent to Edwards a Gold Star lapel button "which you may wear as appropriate identification with your late son S/Sgt. John Leonard Edwards, who gave his life in defense of our country against hostile force".

"I had it mounted on a piece of round agate, "John writes" a light orange with light blue and brown, with an outside mounting of gold for a bolo tie which I wear day and night. Several offered me \$100 for it, but I'll wear it to my grave. . . I'm going to donate the flag from his grave, so I can see it flying daily from the fort. I am very proud of him, and it was an honor to be his father. So now I want to help other kids and if I can make some kid as good as Johnny was, I'll die happy!"
