HATS OFF TO NATION'S SAFE TRUCK DRIVERS.

President Johnson proclaims May 12-18 as 1968 National Transportation Week and the country should honor the men who pilot trucks across the land and have fewer accidents than the general public.

Professional truckers have far fewer wrecks than any other group on the highways. Trucks account for 16.1% of registered vehicles in the US, but only 10.9% are involved in accidents, says the National Safety Council.

Autos, on the other hand, make up 81.3% of vehicles, but account for 85.5% in accidents. A study of 104,000 mishaps showed 70% were non-preventable on the part of the truck driver. In fatals, 80% were non preventable.

As the result of industry training programs, these men today are "defensive" drivers, ever alert for other

It is hard to realize that the trucking industry is the 2nd largest in the US, next to agriculture, annual revenue being \$11.1 billion in 1967, grown from nothing in 1900 when someone first strapped a box on the back of a horseless carriage and gave this industry its start.

By 1904 there were 700 trucks, most converted from autos. In 1920 there were over a million, and today there are 15 million! Now 3 out of 4 tons of freight are moved by truck: everything from lingerie to space vehicles!

And trucks pay their share for highways, about \$4 billion yearly in federal, state and local user taxes. And their expenses are great: 21 billion gallons of fuel, 371 million gallons of oil, 21 million tires, 5 million gallons of paint, and many other items, used by their more than 8 million employes!

Courtesy and safety are their watchwords. They have a "10 commandments" for driving, topped by "Give other motorists the breaks that you wish they'd give you". Yes, let's salute America's truck drivers!-CI

START PAVING FREEWAY ROADS






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


FIELD DAY TOMORROW

Many do not realize that if the y operate under a fictitious name or one that does not show actual names of owners, they must file a certificate with the county and run it in the paper where the business is, for 4 weeks. Also if your certificate is 5 years old, it is void and must be redone. The Sun has the forms and takes care of the whole matter at a reasonable cost, including affidavits for bank, county, etc.
