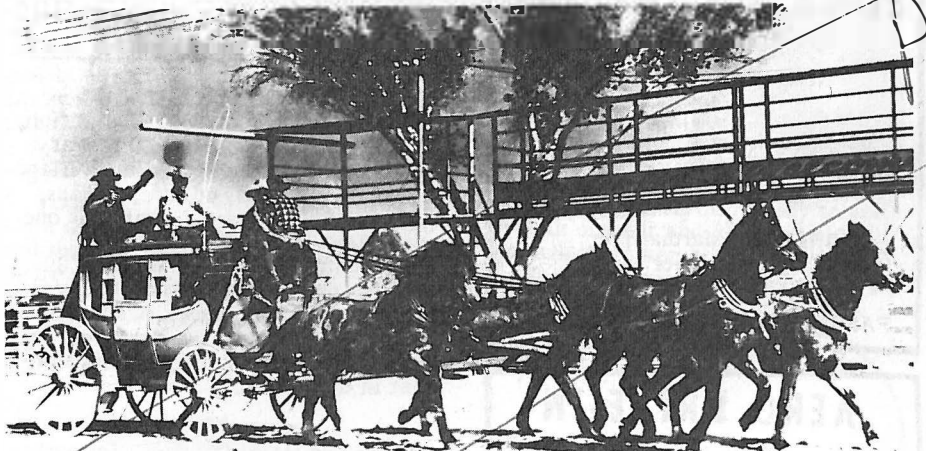
## GUNFIGHTERS LEASE SLEEPY HOLLOW

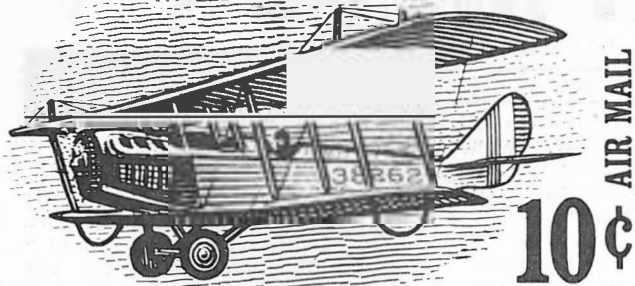

A 100-sheet of this was printed in error with the plane upside down and today collectors place a value of \$20,000 on each stamp, or a total of \$2,000,000.

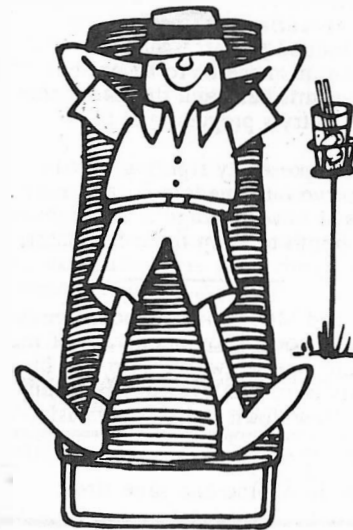

# EDITORIAL

## METROPOLITAN "FARMERS" GET TAX DEDUCTIONS.

The Internal Revenue Service has revealed that wealthy off-farm investors are using "farms" to evade payment of federal income taxes.

Many in various fields are using this idea for "tax deductions", and getting away with it. An analysis of the IRS records for 1965 income, showed 103 of 119 millionaires filing farm income returns, reported losses on farm-

ing. Of 202 with incomes between \$500,000 and \$1 million, 196 reported farming losses. Figures were similar for wealthy taxpayers in lower brackets.

"Farmers" in 31 of 85 of the biggest metropolitan areas claimed \$141 million more in farm losses than profits! In the LA-Long Beach area where movie and show business folks are among big investors, showed the biggest claims for farm losses in excess of profits-- \$41.8 million.

In an endeavor to plug this leak, Sen. Lee Metcalf (D-Mont.) has introduced a bill and other members of congress are joining this tax fight. Many big corporations are going in for this for tax "shelters".

Up in North Dakota they are trying to wipe out the anti-corporation farming law and last year Gov. William Guy vetoed legislation, but it was passed over his protest. Now the people are trying to repeal the law.

Thus rapidly rising land prices that limit expansion of family farms, upon which American prosperity was built down through the years, and entry of young men into farming, can be blamed partly on this new and well financed competitor-- the city based corporation "farmer".

It is indeed a shame that the American farm seems to be on the wane, for this has been the backbone of the country's progress and food supply.

We are presently fighting abroad to "preserve our freedoms", and maybe we will have to wage a war right here at home to keep these freedoms.

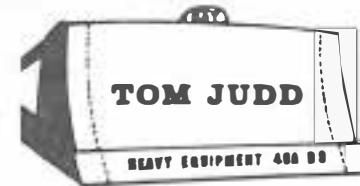

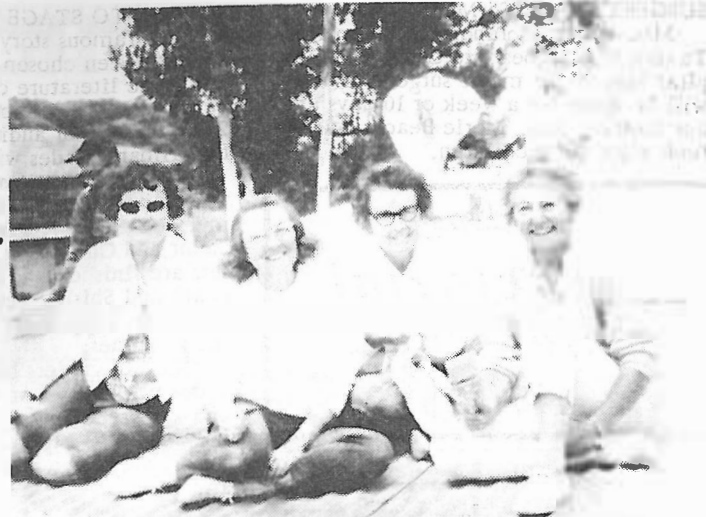
