APPROVE CANYON WATER LINES

Rio SD MWD directors have approved engineering plans for the new water system for Harbison Canyon which are being sent to Washington for approval. reports Engineer-Manager Ed Houser. The grant of 74 ,000 will meet part of the cost, estimated at \$149,200. Sept. 19 has been set for bid opening date.

This will give some houses at higher levels which have suffered periodical low pressure, ample water from the 16,137 feet of new lines.

In addition the district will have to spend \$40,000 for reconnecting some present lines which will continue in use, reconnecting fireplugs, and some lines serving residences, and engineering and legal fees, added Houser.



EDITORIAL

HERE ARE A, B, C'S FOR REVOLUTION IN U.S.A.

A good American subscriber handed this in with the observation that it smacks of communism. It was printed in the New World News, Feb. 1946, and now, 22 years later, it loosk like this nation is suffering from these A.B.C's of revolution!

"On a dark night in May, 1919, two lorries rumbled across a bridge and on into the town of Dusseldorf. Among the dozen rowdy, singing "Tommies" apparently headed for a gay evening were two representatives of the Allied Military Intelligence. These men had traced a wave of undiscipline, mutiny, and murder among the troops to the local headquarters of a revolutionary organization established in the town. Pretending to be drunk, they brushed by the sentries and arrested the ringleaders -- a group of thirteen men and women seated at a long table.

"In the course of the raid, the Allied officers emptied the contents of the safe. One of the documents found in it con-

It is reprinted here to show the strategy of materialistic revolution, and how personal attitudes and habits of living affect the affairs of nations:

"A. Corrupt the young. Get them away from religion. Get them interested in sex. Make them superficial; destroy their ruggedness.

"B. Get control of all means of publicity and thereby:

1. Get people's minds off their government by focusing their attention on athletics, sexy books and plays, and other trivialities;

2. Divide the people into hostile groups by constantly harping on controversial matters of no importance.

3. Destroy the people's faith in their natural leaders by holding these latter up to ridicule, obloquy and contempt.

4. Always preach true democracy, but seize power as fast and as ruthlessly as possible.

5. By encouraging government extravagance, destroy its credit, produce fear of inflation with rising prices and general discontent.

6. Foment unnecessary strikes in vital industries, encourage civil disorders and foster a lenient and soft attitude on the part of government toward such disorders.

7. By specious arguments cause the breakdown of the old moral virtues; honesty, sobriety, continence, faith in the pledged word, ruggedness.

"C. Cause the registration of all firearms on some pretext, with a view to confiscate them and leaving the populace helpless."



A hot and fast fire that started at 6 pm Saturday seared over 70 acres during 12 hours out of control, was contained Monday night but kept firemen on the alert Tuesday. It was the first big one in the Descanso area of Cleveland National Forest southwest or the Barrett Honor Camp. Borate bombers were busy, flying from Ramona, right over Alpine till dark.


