



OPTIMISTS CELEBRATE GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY.

This community should be proud of its lively little Alpine Optimist Club, which, as part of the great Optimist International of which 2600 clubs work with over 3 million boys and spend more than \$4 million yearly. Back in 1919 only 11 clubs worked with a few hundred lads.

One of the finest programs in their youth help program is their national oratorical contest, one of which was staged here recently. The idea started

40 years ago, the original purpose a self-improvement activity for boys.

Since then perhaps a million young men have competed in various club contests, and many today point with pride to their business success due in part to this inspiring project. This year 41 lads competed in five preliminary contests, \$6,000 in scholarships was awarded to the five finalists.

Among the varied activities promoted by Optimists for boys are team athletics, conservation, swim and radio clubs, Scout and YMCA group projects and many others topped by a bike safety week also hunter safety and first aid classes.

Last year a new club building record was set--221 new clubs, while the current year topped that with 258. Optimists have thus proved that their slogan "Friend of the Boy", is valid from its first 50 years of service. And while it is helping youngsters, it helps club members by instilling the philosophy of optimism in all by using the famous Optimist's Creed which starts out with "Promise Yourself-- To be so strong that nothing can disturb your peace of mind".

Everyone should follow the action of a great optimist, Joe Sunnen who said "See the need. . . do what you can. . . where you are. . . with what you have. . . and do it NOW!".

You might gain something by giving a bit of your time in attending an Optimist meeting here at the Youth Center Wednesday nights at 7:30. As some philosopher once said "When you feel sorry for yourself, go out and do something for someone else."






RODEO DRAWS LARGEST CROWD EVER

Perhaps the biggest attendance at any event in Alpine was here Sunday at the rodeo on the Youth Center ballfield.

Both Saturday shows and the Sunday one saw the bleachers nearly filled, which insures a regular annual rodeo, believes Woodie Mitchell, its promoter, who with his wife Pat and manager Fred Williams really labored day and night on the big event.

Photo shows the Saturday crowd with cowboys roping a steer. Visitors came from near and far and all enjoyed the IRA world championship events plus the clowning, bucking horses and other fun, including the barbecue and Saturday night dance.

Sheriffs and CHP officers aided in traffic control, but there was not an accident or trouble to mar the 2-day event which brought Alpine a lot of



fine publicity.

Mitchell, well pleased with the entire show, says they plan now on an annual rodeo. Over 200 cowboys competed in the many events, some coming from as far as Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado, Utah, even Louisiana.

Jim Ramsey, a Californian, took the all-around cowboy title and prizes totalled nearly \$11,000., number of entires being the largest any IRA sponsored rodeo had ever drawn in the Southland.




