The Junior High department is enthusiastically preparing to present its annual Science Fair. This traditionally successful event will be Thursday, Feb. 27 between 7:30 and 9: in the school auditorium. Under the direction of Clifford Owens, this activity is primarily aimed at combining creativity with scientific thinking.

With emphasis on ingenuity and the scientific approach, students explore almost every conceivable subject including: animal behavior, solar energy, weather, human relations, electricity, microscopic research, plant reactions and many others. The topic is limited only by the requirements that it is interesting to the student, answers a question and be original.

Prizes will be given within each of the three participating grade levels: 6th, 7th and 8th. The judges will base their decisions on presentation and the use of prescribed scientific procedure: (1) state the problem, (2) research, (3) hypothesis (educated guess), (4) experimentation and observation, and (5) conclusion.

The five 7th and 8 grade award winners will then be eligible to compete in the SD Science Fair with students selected from the entire county.



TOMATO BUYER MADE TO PAY HIGH.

Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., who might have made a very fine President, is trying to get President Nixon and the Agriculture Dept., to rescind an arbitray order banning small, vine-ripened tomatoes from Mexico.

He claims the department was used by Florida growers to play a cruel trick on Mexican growers with their most perishable product and forcing US consumers to eat large and highly priced tomatoes.

American housewives, he pointed out, might be interested to know that what they commonly pay 34¢ a pound for, are being fed to cattle, over the border. He charged that the ban was imposed by former Ag Secretary, Orville L. Freeman, at the apparent whim of Florida growers.

S trange that America, which boasts how it aids many small and poor nations, should stop about 50% of Mexico's winter crop from coming in, much to the chagrin of officials, which is causing no

little problem in US foreign relations.

The order, effective Jan. 8, results in losses of \$105,000 daily at the Nogales port of entry. The ban represents 35% of the crop of West Mexico, and the fruit is rotting on the vines on 8400 acres of tomato fields.

Another point is that the Mexicans spend about half of their cost of growing tomatoes, in the US on machinery, seeds and other equipment.

Sad to relate, this is but one of the numerous things that are producing unrest and disgust in this country. The consumer is the goat for he must pay and pay and pay. Sheer stockings are built to last only so long, then the girls go buy new ones. Likewise light globes are made to run just a limited number of hours when they burn out. Go buy more. 

POOL TOURNEY ENDS NEXT WEEK





are fast being done.






